

U. S. GIVES \$10,000 FOR FIRE FIGHTING

Salem, Ore., March 27.—This year the federal forest department will spend \$10,000 for forest fire protection in western Oregon. This is double the amount spent in the state by the national forest service last year.

Chicago, Ill.—By catching a man as he jumped from a second story window with his clothing ablaze, and rolling him in the snow, Mrs. Mamie Lawrence saved his life when the Grand Boulevard Automobile Garage company, East Fortieth street and Grand boulevard, was destroyed by fire. Abraham Meens, the man Mrs. Lawrence caught, is an automobile upholsterer, and was trapped in the second story when the fire started. Mrs. Lawrence, who sells papers at the Grand boulevard station of the South Side Elevated road, saw the man hesitating at the window and called to him: "Jump and I'll catch you!"

Meens jumped and his body struck her outstretched arms, knocking her backward into a snowdrift. His clothing was still burning, and she jumped to her feet, rolled him backward and forward in the snow and beat the burning clothing with her hands till the flames were totally extinguished.

When it was over she went back to her work and refused to admit she had done anything extraordinary. Twenty-seven automobiles of expensive make were destroyed in the fire and the building was burned to the ground. The firemen estimated the entire loss at about \$100,000.

Joseph Weiss, the elevator man, who continued to run the elevator while the fire was burning, was slightly burned, as were Morris Meyers and L. Derevenski, two other automobile upholsterers.

A GOOD LICKER OF STAMPS MIGHT GET A JOB

San Francisco.—If you were an office boy and had to lick an average of 243,000 postage stamps every month, how long do you suppose that your tongue would last? Do you think that no office boy could do it? The Southern Pacific company uses this many stamps every thirty days and while one boy in the general offices of the company at San Francisco does not place all of them on envelopes, he has to perforate the initials on each stamp before they are distributed from the treasurer's office.

In January of this year 24,000 one-cent stamps were used by the Southern Pacific. During the same period 173,000 two-cent stamps, 10,000 three, 13,000 four, 13,000 five, 3,000 eight and 6,000 ten were used. January is an average month in the use of stamps, say the clerks in the treasurer's office. The Southern Pacific uses approximately \$48,000 worth of postage stamps annually.

Every time a two-cent stamp is placed on a letter the railroad must haul one ton of freight three and one half miles. Think of it! All it costs to haul a ton of freight three and one-half miles is two cents. The government charges the same rate to haul a letter that weighs one ounce. True, the post office department transports the letter more than three and one-half miles for two cents, but you have to pay two cents to have it taken even a half mile.

All of the Southern Pacific stamps are perforated with the company initials before they are distributed. This is done for the purpose of identification. Upon different occasions the Southern Pacific depots have been burglarized of several hundred dollars worth of postage stamps, but the burglars have never been able to dispose of them. This perforation is done with the permission of the government.
