In January of this year 24,000 onecent stamps were used by the Southern Pacific. During the same period 173,000 two-cent stamps, 10,000 000 eights and 6000 tens were used. January is an average month in the use of stamps, say the clerks in the treasurer's office. The Southern Pa-

worth of postage stamps annually. Every time a two-cent stamp placed on a letter the railroad must haul one ton of freight three and one half miles. Think of it! All it costs to haul a ton of freight three and onehalf miles is two cents. The government charges the same rate to haul letter that weighs one ounce. True, he post office department transports the letter more than three and onehalf miles for two cents, but you have to pay two cents to have it taken even a half mile

Upon different occasins the Southern Pacific depots have been burglarized of several hundred dollars worth of postage stamps, but the burglars have never been able to dispose of them.
