



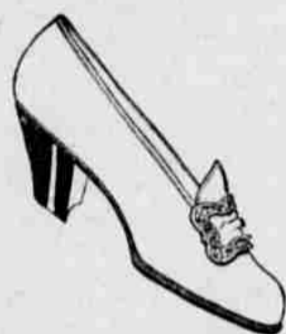

N. Y. JUDGE ORDERS COURT OFFICIALS TO CARRY PISTOLS

New York.—Following the sensational killing of Judge Thornton L. Massie and officers of his court at Hillsville, Va., Chief Magistrate William McAdoo of the New York city courts has decided that all the uniformed attendants and clerks in the courts under his jurisdiction must carry revolvers.

Mr. McAdoo took this step after a consultation with the other magistrates, who agreed that under the former method of conducting the police courts there is little protection afforded the presiding magistrates from attack, because none of the court attendants is armed. Frequently attendants in the police courts have had hand to hand conflicts with members of criminal bands who have visited the courts in behalf of confederates who have been arrested.

LIPTON WILL NOT DENY BETROTHAL TO HEIRESS

London.—Sir Thomas Lipton refuses to deny the report cabled from the United States that he is to marry Miss Ruth Boettcher, the Denver heiress, who several years ago claimed the proud distinction of being the only girl who ever touched the heart of Lord Kitchener. Sir Thomas only remarked:

FRIENDS OF VICTIMS TO HUNT MURDERER

Aberdeen, Wash., March 28.—A posse, composed of seven or eight picked men, close friends of Colin McKenzie and A. V. Elmer, the two deputies murdered in the woods near Satsop, by John Turnow, nearly three weeks ago, is expected to leave here soon to take up the search for the murderer.

The men, who are thorough woodsmen and know the country they are invading, will be provisioned for a three or four weeks' trip. They will not go as deputy sheriffs, but with the sanction of the sheriff. Should the expedition fail, Sheriff Payette will send a posse of picked deputies into the woods to take up the hunt.

The reward now totals \$5000, with the \$1000 offered by the state. Two thousand dollars is offered by the county for the apprehension of Turnow and \$2000 for his arrest and conviction.

Sheriff Payette has refused to make public the names of the special posse to date, but will do so when they leave. Turnow is still supposed to be in the Satsop country. He is known to have had aid during the winter and received mail at Pacific Beach, 50 miles from his present hiding place which is reached by a trail through the woods.
