PAVING MATERIAL SELECTED BY COUNCIL

BITULITHIC FOR EAST WEBB, MACADAM, WEST AND COURT

Some Opposition to This Plan Arises and Aldermanic Body Awaits Possible Objections of Owners of Property.

Resolutions ordering the improvement of East Webb street with bitulithic and West Webb street and East Court street with macadam were passed by the city council last night in spite of warnings of remonstrances taking form among property owners along the latter street, the council taking the attitude that the only proper way to determine the amount of opposition is to order the improvement and await results.

By the resolutions, it is proposed to hard surface East Webb street from the east line of Cottonwood street to the south line of Court, to macadamize West Webb street from its intersection with the O.-W. R. & N. tracks to Tutuilla street and East Court street from Byers Mill race to the eastern city limits.

The resolution ordering the improvement of East Court was opposed by Councilman Dyer on the grounds that no provision is being made for the drainage of the water which flows down from the hillside into the street and for the further reason that with only a strip 24-feet wide macadamized without a curb, the traffic would have a tendency to cut the macadam away on the edges.

City engineer Kimbrell declared the plans provide for the running of the water into the millrace and members of the council as well as the mayor expressed themselves as believing the proposed street would not be damaged by any lack of drainage and declared themselves in favor of the improvement because of the bad condition of the street, which is one of the main traveled thoroughfares.

Engineer Lonergan of the Warren Construction company, proposed as a substitute last night a ten foot hard surface strip down the center of the street with the remainder macadamized but the general sentiment seemed to be that such an improvement would be too expensive for the property owners.

NO VOLCANO UNDER CANAL

Mysterious Gases in Culebra Cut Traced to Oxidation of Pyrites.

Washington.—An explanation of the mysterious emission of steam and hot gases from crevices in the famous Culebra cut, which gave rise to a report that a volcano existed under the Panama Canal zone, is given by the "Canal Record," just received from Panama. It is declared that the phenomena are attributable entirely to the oxidation of iron pyrites, caused by its exposure to the air, and that the temperature developed appears in the course of a few days after the pyrites is uncovered.

LEAVES TOMORROW TO TEACH IN SHANGHAI

For the purpose of taking an excellent teaching position in Miss Jewell's school, a boarding and day school for white children in the city of Shanghai, China, Miss Mary Whitney, of the Washington school teaching corps, leaves here tomorrow. She will sail from San Francisco on the steamer Nile on April 3.

The school in which Miss Whitney will teach is an institution giving grade work and also college preparatory work. It is attended by white children of the mercantile and official class and employs nine teachers aside from the matron of the school, Miss Whitney is to teach the eighth grade and also some high school studies.

In view of the turmoil in which most of the old Chinese empire has been thrown by the revolution and the establishment of the republic, the relatives of Miss Whitney have been imploring her not to take the position. However, she feels that in a coast city such as Shanghai there will be perfect safety and of this fact she has been assured by an uncle and aunt who live not far from Shanghai. Accordingly she will make the trip and is looking forward to her work in the orient with much interest.

After arriving in China, Miss Whitney is to write to the East Oregonian setting forth facts regarding a school in which she will be employed and general facts and impressions regarding China as she finds the new oriental republic.

3 California Murderers Reprieved.

Sacramento, Calif., March 28.—Governor Johnson has granted reprieves to George E. Figuereia, the Los Angeles wife murderer; Willie Luis, a Chinese murderer of his step-mother, and William Burke, who murdered his mistress. All three were to be hanged at San Quentin tomorrow. The reprieves of Burke and Figuereia were extended to May 19 and that of Luis to May 3.
