TRAIN WRECK AVERTED BY SICK MAN'S DREAM

Section Foreman Drags Himself Six Miles to Find Trouble Is Washed Out.

Atlanta.—Awakening from a dream that a near-by trestle on the Southern Railroad had been washed away, O. T. Kitchins, a section foreman, although suffering from illness, went to South River, six miles from Atlanta, before dawn to discover that his dream was a reality.

The foreman found that the stream swollen by heavy rains, had carried away a trestle spanning a 65-foot chasm. A passenger train from Atlanta to Columbus, Ga., soon was due at the opposite side of the river, but Kitchins had no means of crossing the river, which was three-quarters of a mile wide.

Standing on the bank the man "bellowed" for half an hour. Finally he heard an answering shout and called out a warning to J. E. Daniel, who flagged the train just as it neared the brink of the stream.

DOCTORS START WAR ON WASH BASINS

OTHER SUBJECTS RELATIVE TO HEALTH ARE DISCUSSED

Much Time Given to Consideration of Sanitation in Schools and Other Matters of Importance to Younger Generation.

Portland, Ore., March 29.—War on the public wash basin, a foe to health and sanitation that has hitherto escaped almost unnoticed in the flurry of crusades against the drinking cup, the roller towel, the family toothbrush and other immodest breeding places and distributors of germs, was declared by Oregon state, county and municipal health officers, who are holding their annual session to confer on problems of the public health in the Medical building.

Dr. E. P. Geary, Multnomah county health officer, was the one who unmasked the dangers of the wash bowl. Especially as it exists in the schools and public buildings it is a very grave peril, all the more so because not commonly regarded as such, declared Dr. Geary.

"The filthy condition of the ordinary wash basin has escaped our notice," he said. "We are so used to it that we never think of it. Yet 1000 persons will use it in succession and in that time it is never cleaned out or even scalded. It is more dangerous than the roller towel."

Danger Pointed Out.
"Some of our mechanical geniuses ought to be able to devise a wash basin that would make it possible to wash in running water. It would be a matter of economy and most certainly of safety. The danger from skin diseases through public wash basins is very great."

Dr. Geary's remarks were made in the course of a discussion of a paper by Professor L. R. Alderman, state superintendent of public instruction, on "Cooperation Between Schools and Boards of Health." How the schools of the state have been cooperating in the past year with the health officers and problems of health and sanitation they are still called on to face, were told by Professor Alderman.

Hundreds of wells in country districts that had not been inspected in 20 years have been cleaned up or their use proscribed through efforts of the school teachers, he said.

Another achievement on the side of better health for the school youngsters has been better methods of ventilation and the adjustment of windows so as to prevent cross lights which injure the eyes of the pupils.

Eating Too Fast.
One thing that worried Professor Alderman was how to keep the children from eating so fast. After he had told of one class of boys who bolted their lunch in two and one-quarter minutes so they could play ball, Dr. B. T. McCallum of Polk county, came to his rescue with the suggestion that 19 or 15 minutes be set aside for lunch and that no one be allowed to play in that time.

"The teachers are doing the best they can, but the toilets in some of the Oregon schools are a disgrace to civilization," said Professor Alderman.

After announcing that plans were complete for a new six months course on "Health" in the high schools, Professor Alderman asked the doctors to give him suggestions and promised to cooperate with them in every way. They evoked warm praise from Dr. E. A. Pierce.

"In his readiness to cooperate with us, Professor Alderman has shown a splendid spirit," he said. "It means the greatest step forward in sanitation since I have been in Oregon."

Dr. C. H. Wheeler declared that the ventilating systems of nearly all the Portland schools were faulty.

"Nearly all the intakes are within two to four feet of the ground, and as a result get the 'ground atmosphere' that is loaded with carbonic acid gas," he said. "I have fought against this but without avail. For the health of the children intakes should be at least 8 to 10 feet above ground."

TROOPS MAY BE ORDERED TO HOQUIAM

STRIKE SITUATION ON GRAYS HARBOR BECOMES SERIOUS

Mayor Attempting to Have Millowners and Strikers Arbitrate Differences—One Mill Arms Strikebreakers for Protection.

Hoquiam, Wash., March 29.—That Grays Harbor cities will be under martial law within a few hours seems certain from the rioting here yesterday when 350 strikers barred the entrance to the Hoquiam Lumber & Shingle company mill and refused to permit any laborers to enter the yards. Some of the non-strikers were handled roughly and the police were unable to cope with the situation.

Mayor Ferguson spoke to the men and said he would call a meeting of the business men and millmen this afternoon to arbitrate the matter. If this fails trouble will likely ensue.

The strikers then marched to the E. K. Wood mill, where they were greeted with a stream of water from a hose and were beaten back out of the yards.

"Any effort to call out the state troops to quell the impending strike troubles here will be met with great opposition," said W. J. Patterson, a prominent banker. He and other business men were opposed to calling out the state troops, while W. A. Thorn, secretary of the I. W. W. strike committee, voiced the same statement. The situation is still a grave one, the Hoquiam police being compelled to draw their guns in protection.

"Had they killed one of our men we would have torn them to pieces, said the scabs they were protecting," said a striker.

The Grays Harbor Commercial company at Cosmopolis yesterday received a shipment of 180 30-30 rifles, and Manager Neil Cooney says that he will resist any attempt to enter his property. A live wire of high voltage is said to be stretched around the plant.

The commissaries and soup houses established in both cities are flourishing, and 3000 men are being fed daily. There are only three mills operating in Hoquiam, the Wood, Eureka and Grays Harbor plants.
