COAST TO COAST BIRDMAN KILLED

CAL RODGERS FALLS 200 FEET WITH AEROPLANE

Tragedy Occurs Few Hundred Feet From Point Where Transcontinental Flight Was Completed—Neck Broken by 200 Foot Drop.

Long Beach, Cal., April 4.—Calbraith P. Rodgers, an aviator of world-wide fame and the first man to cross the American continent in an aeroplane, was almost instantly killed here yesterday when his Wright biplane, in which he was soaring over the ocean, crashed to the earth from a height of 200 feet, and buried him in the wreck. His neck was broken and his body crushed by the engine of his machine. He lived but a few minutes. Rodgers for a week past had been making daily flights here and had taken many passengers, both men and women, up with him. He started from his usual place and soared out over the ocean, crossing the pier, and then turned and dipped close to the roller coaster.

Plays With Sea Gulls.
Seeing a flock of gulls sporting themselves among a great school of sardines just over the breakers, Rodgers again turned and dove down into them, scattering the feathered sea fowl in all directions. Highly elated with the outcome of his dive Rodgers then flew farther out to sea, all the time gradually rising until he had reached a height of 200 feet. Making a short turn he started at full speed for the pier, then suddenly dipped his planes and his machine began a frightful descent.

Rodgers was seen by hundreds of persons on the pier to relax his hold on the levers, and then, seemingly realizing that he was in danger, he made a strenuous effort to pull the nose of his machine into a level position. Falling in this he managed to turn his craft farther in shore and an instant later the huge craft crashed into the edge of the surf, not 500 feet from the spot where on December 10, last he finished his ocean to ocean flight.

Life Guards Rush to Assist.
Life guards were the first to reach the injured man. They said Rodgers' head was hanging over one wing of the machine, the heavy engine on his back and his feet drawn up, nearly doubling over his shoulders. Blood was flowing freely from his mouth.

DOG DAYS ON SATURDAY.
Tulsa Catchers Ordered to Let "Houn" Alone on Sabbath.

Tulsa, O.—The spirit of the famous Missouri houn' dawg song: "You gotta quit kickin' my dawg aroun'," has born fruit in this city. Hereafter dog catchers will suspend operations on Saturday, the day most farmers come to town, in order that no country dogs will be impounded, and possibly put to death by mistake. The dog catchers are under the jurisdiction of the Humane society. The plaintive wailing of a "hound" on the way to the pound touched the heart of the principal officer of the Humane society and led to the order just issued.
As might be expected, the captured hound proved to be a country dog.

Dormitory Matron Finds Even Cream Doesn't Supplant Meat.

LAZY LIVING COMES HIGH.

Kansas City, Mo.—The cause of all this clamor about the high cost of food stuff lies in the fact that women pay far more attention to bargain counter sales in the drygoods stores than to the grocery stores.

This is the conclusion of Miss Grace Ferguson, domestic science teacher at the Central High School, who directed a score of girl co-ed waitresses, serving 148 persons that visited the school to see a 12-cent meal.

"Women do not search after sales in food products," Miss Ferguson said today. "They take it for granted because one thing is high priced that everything is. So they sigh over the telephone and tell the grocer they 'guess they'll take that.' And 'that' is always higher than something else equally palatable and nutritious. The average woman is too content to let the groceryman prepare the menu for her. Laziness is not the least of the evils attending this high-cost cry."

TOUCHES WIRE WITH 6600 VOLTS; IS DEAD

Colfax, Wash.—Paul Carrol, section foreman at Steptoe on the Spokane & Inland electric line, received a voltage of 6600 while attempting to learn how to regulate a switch light. Carroll was killed instantly as he touched the high tension switch in the transformer station. Coroner Bruning's inquest jury decided that Carroll had orders to stay out of the transformer station, although he was allowed a key and that his death looked almost like suicide. The company was censured for allowing a switch lock on the transformer station, saying the electrician should have a private key. Carroll, a native of Ireland, is said to have no relatives.
