WHEN AN EGG IS NOT AN EGG?

Michigan Merchant Learns One Answer to Conundrum.

Instead, however, he took out the top tray and there found nice rows of black dirt where eggs should have been. The same condition was found in all of the other crates—one tray of eggs, four trays of dirt.

CELLAR FALLS INTO MINE.

Housewife Lower's Ladder and Trapped Workers Climb to Surface. Scranton, Pa.—Mrs. Patrick Jordan of Elm street was eating break-

fast when she heard muffled calls for help coming as if from the cellar. When she descended the cellar stairs to investigate she discovered that during the night the entire cellar of the house had dropped into the mines, leaving a hole about ten feet in diameter and twelve feet deep.

At the bottom of the pit were two miners, the lamps on their caps shining like fireflies in the inky blackness and it was their shouts that had startled the woman.

Recovering from her momentary fright, Mrs. Jordan listened to what the men were saying, and learned that they could not reach the slope owing to a cave-in, so were calling for a ladder with which to climb to the surface.

Mrs. Jordan borrowed a ladder and lowered it into the mine. The men ascended from the workings and after expressing their gratitude to Mrs. Jordan, departed through her home for the breaker, a mile distant.

DEATH OF YAKIMA INFANT IS PROBED

Mother Is On Trial Charged With Having Killed Child Soon After Birth.

North Yakima, Wash.—In the trial of Mrs. Eva Burtland for killing her infant a few hours after its birth, February 18, the court session was taken up with the testimony of J. T. Hedges, the ditch tender who found the body of the baby lodged against the screen of a ditch near First and Cherry avenues early on the morning of February 19, and of Drs. J. E. Lane and Thomas Tetreau, who performed the autopsy on the body of the baby, which showed that it had died by drowning rather than by smothering as was claimed by Mrs. Burtland at the inquest.

\$9000 HEART BALM FOR JILTED WOMAN

Miss Sophia Blumenfeld Gets Verdict in Breach of Promise Suit Against Hiram L. Sanger—Defendant Fails to Appear in Court.

Chicago, Ill.—A jury before Judge Cooper in the superior court awarded damages of \$9000 to Miss Sophia Blumenfeld, 28 years old, 5473 Ridge-wood court, in her breach of promise suit against Hiram L. Sanger.

Sanger, who is a bottle supply dealer at 1521 South State street, failed to defend the suit and judgment was returned by default, the jury assessing the damages, after Miss Blumenfeld related her story on the stand. On October 17, 1911, he proposed and was accepted, Miss Blumenfeld declared.

Soon after their engagement he announced that he would not marry her, and then followed the suit for damages of \$15,000, according to the young woman. The wedding was set for November 29, 1911.

According to Attorney Julius Held man, counsel for Miss Blumenfeld, Sanger, a widower and 45 years old, had boasted prior to the bringing of Miss Blumenfeld's suit that he had been engaged to three different women and did not intend to marry any of them.

NEGRESS KILLS 17.

Head of Dusky "Church of Sacrifice" Tells of Murders.

Lafayette, La.—Clementine Barnabé, a half-blood negress, told a story here that the police authorities say they accept as clearing the mystery veiling the killing of 20 negroes in southwest Louisiana, and which it is said gave clues that will fix the guilt for 15 other night assassinations of blacks in Louisiana and Texas.

From Clementine's story, it appears she led a mysterious negro cult, the members of which performed the rites of "human sacrifice."

The negress declared she killed 17 of the victims with her own hands. Black Butcheress Calm. The police declare Clementine told her story of wholesale slaughter with no apparent apprehension that the taking of human life was a crime. Without reservation, she told her part in the 35 assassinations, but declined to reveal the names of members of the mysterious cult that helped her.

The murders have been committed in the last year. As one series of killings was added to another in different towns of southwest Louisiana and southeast Texas, the authorities concluded that one mind directed all. Today the negress confessed she was the directing head of the cult that is known as the "Church of the Sacrifice," which has for the feature of its creed the belief that by life sacrifice alone may a person gain immortality.

Hopes Pinned to "Voodoo." Before engaging in any of these crimes Clementine armed herself with a "voodoo," which she got from a preacher and which she and other members of her band were assured would protect them from the law.

While the exact reason for the murders is not explained to the satisfaction of the authorities, it is believed Clementine and her companions were degenerates and that their weakened brains evidently were affected by the exhortations they had heard in the "Church of Sacrifice."
