Son of British Statesman Teaches Residents a New Trick in Politics. Burlingame. — Alexander Balfour, who is the son of Arthur J. Balfour, the leader of the house of commons, is showing the local residents a few new tricks in political science.

Balfour organized the Burlingame Home League, which is opposed to the present municipal administration of Burlingame. The league recently defeated a school bond issue for \$100,000. The bond issue question, however, will be voted upon again next Monday.

Balfour turned a neat trick by announcing that the Home League had the following candidates for school trustees: Mrs. J. M. Vickerson, Chas. Hackmeier and J. J. Trieste. The opposition ticket, which is known as the Good Government League, has for its candidates Mrs. M. M. Miller, C. C. Barre and William Edwards.

When asked why the Home League put up a ticket this time, the son of the great statesman answered: "We are opposed to the bond issue. Should we lose this point and elect our trustees, we will still hold the money bags. Do you get me?"
