ANTI-ROOSEVELT METHODS SHOWN

DIXON DECLARES TAFT MEN ARE REVOLUTIONARY

Postmasters as Chairmen of County Conventions Are Refusing to Certify Election of T. R. Men But Certifying Beaten Taft Men.

The success which Roosevelt's candidacy is having in various sections of the country, and something of the methods being used in the fight against him by the Taft forces is shown in the following telegram sent by Senator Dixon to Frederick W. Mulkey and a copy of which has just been received by Dr. L. U. Temple, president of the local Roosevelt Republican Club:

Washington, D. C., April 8, 1912. Hon. Frederick W. Mulkey, Portland, Oregon.

This will be a Roosevelt week. Missouri led off today with primaries in several districts. Governor Hadley

wires that result insures control in the state convention for Roosevelt and two-thirds of the congressional districts. Further detailed reports from Kentucky show that Roosevelt forces undoubtedly carried a majority of the congressional districts and the state convention. The opposition is using revolutionary methods in the effort to save the state for Taft. In several cases postmasters who were chairmen of county conventions have refused to certify the election of Roosevelt delegates and have given certificates to Taft men who were defeated two to one by the voters. Senator Dixon today sent a formal protest to President Taft, pointing out that these federal office holders in Kentucky had assaulted the president's personal honor by their disregard for his public declaration against political activity by federal office holders, and demanding the immediate citation of these men to trial for their violation of the law. He is preparing formal charges to the civil service commission against these men.

Roosevelt forces have carried Muskegon county, Michigan, insuring control of the 90th district. Moore county, North Carolina, instructed for Roosevelt today. This is the tenth North Carolina county to vote all for

Roosevelt.

Song, Music, Boxing, Wrestling and Jui Jitsu are Interesting Features of Program Carried Out at Rooms Last Night.

Burns was considerably smaller than his opponent but made up in science what he lacked in size. Both men demonstrated that they have an intimate knowledge of the fine points of the game and their contest was received with vociferous approbation. Dudley Evans refereed the bout which was free from damage.

From the gymnasium, the crowd filed back to the club rooms where more music was enjoyed until a late hour. In the Board of Trade room, liquid refreshments were served with Billy Taylor presiding at the fountain.

Altogether, the smoker was an immense success and the officers of the association as well as the entertainment committee is deserving of a full measure of credit for this success.
