the part of the supervisors is taken in the spirit in which it is given and for this reason protests are not as numerous as might be expected. In one case, however, a teacher of the three R's was heard to remark in Pilot Rock that she would stand for no such foolishness on the part of school supervisors, no matter whether they chewed gum or parted their hair in the middle. This good, old lady it seems has been twice married and is therefore quite capable of defending herself in such an emergency. She has a saberlike proboscis and a foot movement that many an amateur prizefighter would pay a good price to possess.

Very shortly following this incident and before the woman had scarcely gotten the reins of her school in hand, having been teaching only three days, she was honored by a visit from Supervisor Tonkin, who proceeded to find much fault with her work, her methods and the woman in general. According to Mrs. Ralston she gave no reasonable offense. She was using the proper system of instruction, had a contract duly signed, had the best credentials going and was getting along very well without Tonkin's help. However, she disliked the rural supervisor system and proceeded to tell the supervisor so. Nevertheless, she answered all of his questions, save the one as to how many years she had been teaching. To that question she replied she did not know how many years as she had been teaching almost all her life.

Reporting that the woman was hostile in manner, had refused to give information regarding her teaching papers and her length of service, Tonkin brought about her discharge by the local board despite the fact she had a nine months' contract and legally could not be removed save for certain grave causes. It was on March 31 Mrs. Ralston was asked to resign but she was allowed to continue work for several days longer, during which time a successor arrived at the school.

Meanwhile, feeling that she had been greatly wronged, Mrs. Ralston appealed her case to Superintendent Welles. However, that official quickly upheld the action of his subordinate and in a letter added further to the woman's discomfiture by gravely setting forth the charges which Tonkin had made against her. He declined to visit the school in person. According to Mrs. Ralston, the charges are entirely unfounded and she is a plain victim of jobbery. As a result of the affair she is out of employment and is even more bitterly than ever disposed against the school supervisor system in Umatilla county. While she has not been a suffragist in the past she declares she is now and wishes she had a vote.

EXILE COST OF FREEDOM.

Murderer Pardoned on Condition That He Leaves the Country.
Boston.—The pardon committee of the executive council voted to pardon Thomas Lowe of North Andover, who is serving a life sentence in the state prison for the murder of Nellie Sullivan at her home in the town.
The members of the Sullivan family have for many years defiantly refused to favor the pardon, fearing untimely consequences should Lowe be liberated.
Through the efforts of Father Michael Murphy, chaplain of the prison, a written statement was secured from all the surviving members of the family, consenting to a pardon on condition that Lowe leave for a foreign country immediately.
Lowe is rounding out his twenty-eighth year in prison.

Louisville, Miss.—The monument erected in honor of Miss Janie Sharp in the Rural Hill cemetery near here has been shot almost to pieces by unknown vandals. The shaft was paid for by popular subscription.
Miss Sharp is the young woman who was attacked and killed several years ago and for whose death Swinton Permenter, her former sweetheart, is in prison, charged with murder.
The affair is considered another step in the Shap-Permenter feud, which has been in progress two years.
The situation between the two factions daily is becoming more tense. A short time ago Don Walker, a detective, who was a witness in the case was assassinated while at the supper table. He was shot through a window.

GIANT TREES IN BRAZIL.
John Muir Tells of His Year's Exploration in South America.
New York.—John Muir, explorer and botanist, has returned after an absence of almost a year in South America and Africa in search of rare trees. Muir is 74 years old, but he boasts he can cover as much ground daily as the average man twenty years his junior.
The botanist entered the forests of Brazil in a hunt for araucaria trees, a species he regards as important to botanical science and which he only had seen in botanical gardens.
"Along the banks of the Parana I discovered thousands of acres of the queerest forest I ever saw," said Muir. "The trees attain a height of more than a hundred feet. They are called Brazilian pine."
