

KILLERS BUYING STOCK FROM RAISERS

PORTLAND COMMISSION MEN ARE COMPLAINING

Purchases Made At Smaller Figures—Situation Good, Generally—Hogs Holding Good—Sheep Unchanged—Wheat Advances.

(From Friday's Journal.)

The fact that local packers are going out into the country and are buying livestock for less than they have been paying in the North Portland yards, is having its effect upon the trade here. Commission men at the yards complain regarding the situation as they say that it narrows the trade here to such an extent that the business is being hurt.

High priced men are sent out into the country to pick up the supplies from the ranchers thereby taking that much stuff away from the public offering. Were this stock not obtainable in the country for less money than here the buyers would not be sent out, according to livestock commission men.

For awhile it was thought that the buying in the country was simply an attempt to take the trade away from the dressed meat market of Front street but now livestock commission handlers say that packers are using the country purchases as a wedge to hold down the price in the yards.

Situation Generally Good. Nevertheless there is quite a fair situation for livestock at the North Portland yards, while a large per cent of the showing for the day came direct to a local packing company from its buyers in the country, the stock that came upon a free market was taken hold of and prices were continued.

This was true of the better class of cattle, but ordinary stock is showing some neglect, and for the range of prices is not quite so good as formerly.

The only two loads of cattle that came forward to the open market at North Portland, sold at \$6.75 for the best offerings. Efforts to squeeze \$3.80 for this class of stuff proved unavailing, although this price could

SUFFRAGETTES IN A CLASH OVER A LEADER, A MAN

Iowa Party Is Disrupted by the Attempted Removal of Male Manager. Des Moines, Iowa.—Militant methods have supplanted moral suasion in the Iowa woman's suffrage campaign and the entire female party in the state has divided into factions "over a man."

The controlling faction at a special meeting passed resolutions demanding the removal of H. G. Gue (a man) as manager of the suffragist headquarters. Following this, women adherents of Gue's cause seceded and organized a new woman's suffragist party known as the Mary Coggeshall Club. The courts (composed of men) will have to decide which faction is entitled to spend \$25,000 left for the cause of suffrage by the late president, Mary Coggeshall.

The only person who didn't say anything, or who didn't get a chance to say anything, was the man. He sat back quietly and let his women hear-tenants handle his case. But outside, he has sued four of the women for \$10,000 damages for slander.

COUNTRY IS TO HAVE WAR ARM IN THE AIR

Secretary Stimson Preparing Statement Showing Development of Aeroplane Service.

Washington.—What is expected to be the most comprehensive statement on military aeronautics ever written is now being prepared by the secretary of war in response to a resolution just adopted by the house. The inquiry was from Representative Sharp of Ohio and asks for practically everything the war department knows about military aeronautics, its availability as an arm of offense and defense, the number and character of the aerial fleets maintained by the various powers, the number of aeroplanes in the United States army and the plans that have been made by the war department for developing this branch of the service.

This is a comprehensive inquiry, but the most of the information necessary for an answer is now in the hands of the war department, where it has been accumulating for the last two years. Prior to that one of the standard works on military aeronautics was the pamphlet by Major Geo.
