POLICE TAKE WOMEN IN SOCIETY POKER GAME

Sixth Feminine Player, Who Is Said to Have Given "Tip," Escapes—Hostess Declares "It Was Just for Fun."
Chicago, Ill.—South Side society poker players ran afoul of the police department a second time when a pair of detectives from the Cottage Grove avenue station broke up a friendly game operated under the personal charge of Mrs. Elizabeth Long at her home, 216 East Twenty-Fourth street, and took five of the six fair participants to the Cottage Grove avenue station for an interview with Lieutenant Grady.
Furthermore, the raid will cause considerable distrust among those apprehended, for Mrs. Belle Levy, who they believe "tipped" the game because she was loser, was the only one to make good her escape when the police arrived.
The officers, it is said, received information from the same mysterious informant who gave the Fifteenth street police the location of the game at 4508 Calumet avenue, which was raided Thursday night, that the game at Mrs. Long's was in progress yester-

day afternoon and Officers Gallagher and Reynolds were detailed on the case.
The officers walked boldly to the door, brushed aside the maid who answered the bell and found the five remaining women seated around the table, chips in front of them and "hands" for the deal all before them. The informant had told the police that the game was a "dollar limit" affair, at the beginning of which each player bought a \$20 stack of chips, or rather a stack representing \$17.50, but for which she paid the full \$20. The missing \$2.50 was the house "rake-off," she said.
The hostess, Mrs. Long declared, however, that the game was "5 and 10 cent friendly ante."

YOUNG BELMONT ILL AFTER FINE IN COURT
State Revokes Auto License of August Belmont's Son, Who Ran Down Woman.

Cambridge, Mass.—Morgan Belmont, son of August Belmont of New York, Harvard sophomore and millionaire, has broken down under the exciting incidents of last week and is confined in Beck Hall on the advice

of his physician. A month or so ago young Belmont's auto ran down Mrs. Martha Zapolski. According to the victim of the accident and her son Walter, who was with her, Belmont continued on his way not even glancing backward to see what had befallen his victim.

Mrs. Zapolski was taken to the hospital, where she was confined for a week. Belmont after six weeks of sleuthing by the police was arrested, pleaded guilty of wreckless driving and paid a fine of \$100.
The Massachusetts Highway Commission issued an announcement today that it had revoked the young student's auto license. The Zapolskis reached a financial settlement with the youth.

If the college faculty does not enter into the situation Mr. Belmont will be able to congratulate himself in getting out of a ticklish situation with comparative ease.

ALASKAN MOTION PICTURES A TREAT

SPLENDID WRITTEN DESCRIPTIONS SURPASSED

Entertainment, Education, Amusement and Thrills Abound in Realistic Reproduction of Life and Industry in Northern Ice Zone.

Starting from Seattle, Mr. Dobbs carries an audience through a country of scenic splendor, over seas which give way to northern forests out of which tower majestic snow covered peaks without number, into and through monster snow drifts, down raging rivers, onto vast ice plains that are more wonderful than the Sahara desert and disturbed only by Esquimaux villages of ice huts, and finally onto that natural wonder, the floating ice-field which is a most magnificent and awe-inspiring spectacle.

In one of the trips, a polar bear chase, through water, is reproduced. The bear is within focus of the motion picture every moment of the chase and when the boat, on which the camera is located, bears down on this monarch of the ice-land, the massive beast turns to give battle to his strange pursuer and is apparently about to swallow the audience, when a well directed shot and a faultlessly hurled Esquimaux spear end his life—all in full view of the audience.

Another trip, the vessel invades the home of the Walrus, the native hunters slaying more than one hundred under the camera lens. The return trip is made through a school of millions of these monster sea animals and a most thrilling spectacle is afforded as dozens of them jump from the water within a few feet of the camera, in protest against the invasion.

Native industries—hunting, sledging, trading, tanning, clothes making, etc., are distinctive and instructive features of the collection, while the mining industry, native sports, dances and the part that the faithful dogs play in the life of the frozen zone are vividly portrayed and full of amusement as well as education.

Mr. Dobbs announced several additional features for tonight, and his offering is well worth any effort necessary to see it.

WILSON'S LEAD IN PENNSYLVANIA GROWS

as the presidential preference on the primary ballot met with defeat.
"The victory is all the more important and impressive when it is considered that a strong fight was made from many quarters to break down the Wilson strength all along the line.

"The victory was one recorded by the democratic voters in the face of aggressive opposition, and reflects the popular esteem in which Governor Wilson is held by democrats generally.

"I have been told by the leading democrats of Pennsylvania that Governor Wilson can carry the state if he is the party nominee.

"The addition of seventy-four votes to the Wilson column is a long step forward and with the strength already developed in the elected delegates, it places him at the front in the pre-convention race for the presidency.

"A number of other states strongly in favor of the nomination of Gov. Wilson will soon elect delegates. I am more confident than ever of Governor Wilson's nomination at Baltimore."

Though somewhat overshadowed by the sensational vote on the republican side, the democratic result is really of as great significance within the party as is the Roosevelt victory to the G. O. P. It means that Wilson, by virtue of a tremendous popular vote has made so great an addition to his list of delegates that his nomination is practically certain and it further means that he is the only candidate who would have a chance of carrying the rock-ribbed republican state of Pennsylvania.

It is freely admitted on all sides that with Wilson heading the ticket Pennsylvania would go into the

Gains in Michigan

Washington, D. C., April 16.—Nine counties in Michigan have elected 247 Wilson delegates to the state convention according to advices received at the Woodrow Wilson headquarters in Washington.

The Wilson men have had to contend with powerful opposition by the machine politicians but so far the allies have not succeeded in electing a single delegate against Wilson, though thirty-one are unopposed.

The Wilson managers are delighted with the showing to date and are confident that the Michigan convention will elect a Wilson delegation to the Baltimore convention.

The sentiment of South Carolina delegates is unquestionably in favor of the nomination of Woodrow Wilson for the presidency, according to Senator Ben R. Tillman, who has returned to Washington.

"I have advocated an unopposed delegation to the Baltimore convention," said Senator Tillman, in speaking of the democratic national political situation. "But I do not exaggerate the truth when I say that the sentiment of South Carolina democrats is strongly in favor of the nomination of Woodrow Wilson. This was well illustrated at the meeting of the democratic state committee in Columbia last week.

"Twenty-three members of the committee expressed themselves as favoring Governor Wilson as the presidential candidate to be selected at Baltimore. Eight favor the nomination of Speaker Clark and two are for Harmon."

BUYS BABY OFFERED FOR SALE BY FATHER

Purchaser Will Carry Away Month-old Boy for Whom \$4000 Was Asked in Advertisement.

Chicago, Ill.—Remonto Marconi, the one-month-old baby, who has been offered for sale by his father, Pasquale Morino, will be exchanged for an unknown sum of money.

The father gave out this information, but would not tell who was going to buy the child. Neither would he tell how much money would be given to him in return for his baby.

The story of the Marconi baby is a pathetic one. Two weeks ago Pasquale Morino, the father, lost his position as driver for a local construction company and since that time has been forced to leave Remonto, the baby, and Marie, his 2-year-old sister, alone in the tiny flat at 4836 Wentworth avenue while he trod the streets searching for work.

Finally, two days ago, with no money in the house and with barely enough food to feed the little ones, the distraught father offered to sell the baby boy for \$4000.

A caller, who refused to give his name, but said that he was also a day laborer, was the first to answer Morino's advertisement in a newspaper. The caller said that he did not possess as much as \$4000, but offered to pay the father of little Remonto a monthly installment of \$3 to continue as long as the baby lived. He said that the \$3 was all that he could offer, but that he wanted the baby and was ready to do all in his power to possess him. Morino looked at the baby for a while and then glanced at the 2-year-old baby girl.

"The money for the boy would not take care of the girl," said he brokenly and then he declined the offer.

Other callers came to inspect the blue-eyed, dimpling infant, forced by stern necessity to leave his only remaining parent even before he was able to realize the meaning of the separation, and all said that they would return later with their wives and then reach some decision.

The elder Morino stated that a "man would come to get the baby." Details he would not give. Meanwhile Remonto and Marie play side by side in the Wentworth avenue rooms neither knowing that they will soon be parted because \$4000 is much money and because Morino is in dire need.

MUST BE HEALTHY TO WED IN CATHEDRAL

Chicago Episcopal Pate Will Demand Doctor's Certificates From Couples.

Chicago.—No marriage will be performed in the cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul unless a certificate of health accompanies the license presented by couples who wish to be united in wedlock. This certificate must be signed by a reputable physician and must attest that both parties are physically fit to marry.

The announcement that the marriage license and wedding ring are to be considered as secondary requisites in the Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul was made by Dean Walter T. Sumner.

Though the edict of Dean Sumner was made with the full approval of Bishop C. P. Anderson of the Chicago diocese of the church, embracing ap-

proximately 100 parishes, the order is not one that will affect other churches unless it is advocated by the clergymen themselves.

"The awful wreckage of life which is resulting from indiscriminate marriages," said the dean, "the startling fact that in this country there are no less than 3,000,000 abnormal people for whose care the state must expend two hundred million dollars each year; the marital unhappiness in numberless homes of even intelligent and well to do circles of life—all these combine to emphasize the need of some safeguard against the extension of the evil. Where the law has failed to provide a safeguard the church we hope, will succeed."

MIDNIGHT MOUNTAIN TOP MARRIAGE WEIRD AFFAIR

Bride Casts Father's Ashes to the Winds Before She Becomes Wife of Persistent Wooer.

Los Angeles.—A weird and solemn ceremony was performed at Inspiration Point, Mount Lowe, at midnight when Arthur N. Steward and Hattie R. Laube were united in marriage after the bride had cast to the four winds the ashes of her father.

The pair were married by the Rev. Mr. Miller of Pasadena. The bridegroom said that for five years Miss Laube had refused to marry him, believing it her duty to attend her invalid father. Last week the father died and Miss Laube considered all barriers to the wedding removed.

THREAT FOR MRS. BELMONT

Receives Rambling Letter and \$10 to Be Sent to Mrs. Pankhurst.

New York.—It became known that the police are trying to discover who sent a letter to Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont, prominent suffragist writer, inclosing a \$10 bill and a cable message which the writer instructed Mrs. Belmont to forward to Mrs. Pankhurst, the London suffragette. The message to Mrs. Pankhurst read:

Easter greetings. A great financier in whom I have the greatest confidence assures me that practical measures are being considered by the world's financiers that promise better conditions within a year. Stop inefficient warfare. Remember the heroism of a battalion of women in China.

The letter accompanying this was a rambling affair, threatening Mrs. Belmont if the cable message were not sent.
