### NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT.

Notice is hereby given that at a regular meeting of the Common Council of The City of Pendleton, held on April 18th, 1912, the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, the Surveyor of The City of Pendleton, did on the 18th day of April, 1912, under direction and by requirement of the Common Council, file plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement of College street, in The City of Pendleton, from the south line of Court street to the north line of Alta street, with bitulithic pavement on a bituminous base, together with the estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof, with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the percentage of the total cost of improvement which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such improvement; and

Whereas, the Council has examined such plans and specifications and found the same satisfactory and the estimates therefor to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work; and

Whereas, the property recommended by the City Surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited is, in the judgment of the Common Council, properly to be included within such improvement district, and no property is excluded therefrom which should properly be included therein; and

Whereas, the improvement of the herein above-described portion of said College street with bitulithic pavement on a bituminous base, is at this time necessary; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Common Council of The City of Pendleton, that it is expedient to improve and it is hereby proposed to improve College street in The City of Pendleton, from the south line of Court street to the north line of Alta street, by paving the same with bitulithic pavement on a bituminous base, such pavement to be 34 feet wide, being 17 feet on each side of the center line of said College

Resolved, that the plans and specifications and estimates for such improvement, as prepared by the City Surveyor and filed with the Recorder of The City of Pendleton, on the 18th day of April, 1912, be, and they are hereby, approved and adopted; and be it further

Resolved, that the cost of making such improvement shall be a charge and lien upon all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the owners of such lots, part of lots, and parcels of land so specially benefited by such improvement, shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof; and be it further

Resolved, that an assessment district is hereby created, to be known as Assessment District No. 15, embracing the property to be assessed for the payment of such improvement, which assessment district shall include all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land lying and being within the district bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

line of Alta street, thence westerly to the southwest corner of the Court House Block, thence westerly to the southeast corner of Lot 7, Block 11, original Town of Pendleton, Oregon, thence westerly to the southwest corner of the said Lot 7, thence northwesterly to place of beginning; and be it further

Resolved, that a copy of this resolution, together with the notice that the Surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land, is on file in the office of the City Recorder, be published

for a period of ten days in the East Oregonian, which newspaper is hereby designated by the council for the publication thereof.

At the time when the suffragette window-smashing raid was on, the superintendent of the home was asked to admit for membership a certain ardent suffragette, who was described as an Anglo-American. He telegraphed to Mrs. Reid for instructions and her answer was concise.

"Certainly not. Send further details."

A few days passed and the superintendent wired to Mrs. Reid: "It is all right. She has been sentenced to two months at hard labor."

Very few who know the American Ambassador's wife have any idea of her remarkably widespread charities. The Paris home enables American girls who are studying art or music to live on \$30 a month in comfortable quarters in London.

Mrs. Reid's charities are conducted so quietly that only the recipients know of her kindness, and the begging letter writer is ignored.

**Taft's Purse is Fatter.**  
Personal Tax Report Shows President Has Made \$50,000 in Stocks.

Cincinnati.—President Taft's personal tax return, now on file at the Hamilton county court here, shows that he is \$10,720 richer in property subject to taxation than he was last year. In that time he has accumulated \$50,000 worth of stocks, while last year he held only \$10,000 worth. His cash has decreased from \$3720 to \$840 and his debts are listed as \$6,500. The total value of the presidential property is given as \$51,940.
