SINNOT-ELLIS CONGRESSIONAL RACE IS CLOSE

Secretary of State Olcott is Conceded Victory By His Apponent---Dr. Harry Lane is Chosen as Democratic Senatorial Nominee Apparently.

Portland, Gre., April 20.—(Special)—Indications at 2 o'clock this afternoon were that Colonel Roosevelt had carried the state of Oregon and won the republican presidential nomination. At that hour, incomplete returns from 23 counties gave.

Bourne men assert that when the returns are in from the "back country" counties, he will have a
