NUDE INDIANA HARBOR MAN CARRIED THROUGH STREETS

Women Scamper When Rescuers of Would-Be Suicide Who Plunges Into Ice Water Is Borne Home, Where Forgiving Wife Awaits.

Chicago, Ill.—Four stalwart men, proudly carrying on their shoulders the struggling, wriggling form of a fifth, entirely nude, was the spectacle which threw Indiana Harbor into turmoil and resulted in a scurrying of women from the main thoroughfares of that city.

It was not a political procession nor yet the payment of a freak bet, but the culmination of what at first was expected to be a tragedy.

It seems that John Bladu, after some altercation with Mrs. Bladu in which he threatened to make away with himself, carefully removed every vestige of clothing and announced on the family threshold as he opened the door that he was going to jump into Lake Michigan and die. Then he rushed madly off in the direction of the water.

The frightened wife ran out of the house and began calling wildly for help. Joe Tanity and three companions, all acquainted with Bladu, responded and were told that Bladu had gone to die in the icy waters of the lake. The quartet started on a run for the water front and son espied the nude man in the waves.

They shouted and begged the bather to return to the shore, assuring him that his wife was at peace with him and that any differences would be adjusted to his entire satisfaction if he would only return with them.

He refused to come out and Tanity and his companions entered the water, finally succeeding in capturing the man and dragging him to the shore. Then began the march to the Bladu home with the kicking man on the shoulders of the four captors.

Scarcely had the party started down the street before women, attracted by the noise, caught sight of the burden and scampered screaming into their respective houses. This scene was re-enacted as each block was passed, even policemen turning their backs on the group as it passed by, until the Bladu home was reached and the unwilling load deposited on his own doorstep, amid the thanksgiving wails of the almost distracted wife.

As soon as Bladu could don some clothes he hurried before a justice of the peace and swore out warrants for the arrest of his rescuers on the charge of assault. The men were arrested but when the officers went to summon Mrs. Bladu and the children as witnesses they found the house empty. They had fled, and since then no trace of them has been found.

RESCUE CAP'N TELLS OF TITANIC WRECK

MAKES FULL REPORT AND STARTS FOR MEDITERRANEAN

Captain Describes in Blunt Scaman's Jargon How He Saved Over Seven Hundred Survivors of Great Sea Disaster.

New York, April 20.—Less than 24 hours after the Cunard line steamer Carpathia came in as a rescuing ship with 795 survivors of the Titanic disaster, she sailed for the Mediterranean on a cruise on which she originally started last week.

Just before the liner sailed H. S. Bride, the second Marconi wireless operator of the Titanic, who had both of his legs crushed on a lifeboat, was carried off on the shoulder of the ship's officers to St. Vincent's hospital.

Captain A. H. Rostron of the Carpathia addressed an official report giving his account of the Carpathia's rescue work to the general manager of the Cunard line, Liverpool.

Official Report Made.
The report stated that Captain Rostron first was apprised of the plight of the Titanic at 12:25 a. m. Monday and that he immediately ordered the Carpathia headed for the scene of the disaster, a distance of 58 miles.

At 2:40 a. m. a flare was seen and it was taken to indicate the position of the Titanic. The report stated that the Carpathia passed through a big field of icebergs and several times had to alter her course to avoid ice. The weather was described as fine and clear, though dark. Continuing the report he said:

"We stopped at 4 a. m., thus doing the distance in 3 1-2 hours, picking up a lifeboat at 4:10 a. m. A boat in charge of an officer had foundered. At 8:30 the last boat was picked up. All survivors aboard and all boats accounted for, viz: 15 lifeboats, one boat abandoned, two berthon boats alongside (saw one floating bottom upward among the wreckage, and, according to second officer, senior officer saved) one berthon boat had not been launched, it having got jammed, making 16 lifeboats and four berthon boats accounted for. By the time we had cleared first boat it was breaking day, and I could see all within an area of four miles. We also saw that we were surrounded by icebergs.

The report stated that at 8 a. m. the California arrived, and that her master was told of the tragedy and asked to search for possible survivors. The Carpathia then took aboard 13 of the Titanic lifeboats. A clergyman held a short burial service for the lost and offered a prayer of thanksgiving for those saved.

ASTOR DISGUISES AND SAVES BOY

New York, April 20.—A fine act of heroism is narrated by George A. Hardy of Brooklyn who survived the disaster.

"When Colonel Astor had assisted his tearful young wife and her maid into a life boat he tried to put in a boy, but the sailors refused to let the boy in, saying that the room then was only for girl children. Colonel Astor then picked up a woman's hat from the deck and placed it on the boy's head and brought him back to the boat. He said:

"Here, little girl, climb in," and the officers of the ship let the boy through. As the boat was lowered away, Colonel Astor stood on the deck waving good-bye."

The following statement was issued today at the offices of the Astor estate:

"Mrs. Astor is very ill and under the care of a physician. It will be impossible for her to be interviewed or to give out any statement."
