REVOLVERS STOP WEDDING.

Los Angeles Policemen With Drawn Pistols Save Girl from Abductors.
Los Angeles.—Policemen with drawn revolvers rescued Mary Copic, a pretty 19-year-old Dalmatian girl, from a wedding celebration in which Mary had been an unwilling principal, according to her story.
The girl arrived from Austria and upon her arrival she told the police that Mrs. Luce Ravitz and a number of the latter's friends took her to the home of Tony Rasich. She was informed that Rasich was her husband and a hundred countrymen were brought in to celebrate. The girl's cousins informed the police of the alleged abduction and the rescue followed.
It was stated that the facts would be laid before the federal immigration authorities.

URGED TO STICK TO FAITH.

Rabbis in Conference Tell of World-Wide Missionary Work.
Baltimore.—As an indication of the efforts throughout the nations to strengthen Judaism, Rabbi Gotthard Deutsch, of the Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati, at the central conference of American Rabbis, pointed out that missionaries were being sent to foreign fields in an effort to induce Jews to hold fast to their faith.
In a reporty Rabbi E. N. Callach of Richmond, Va., chairman of the committee on religious work in universities, strong objection was made to college fraternities as subversive of discipline, study and the democratic spirit that should pervade American educational institutions.
For Jewish students it was recommended that an organization be formed for religious and intellectual purposes, not exclusively for social activities, and that some one "on the order of a Young Men's Christian Association secretary," be engaged to give his whole time to this work.

Woman Masquerades in a Long Hunt for Her Husband.
Erie, Pa.—After masquerading two years as a man, Alexandra Kozlowska, 29, fainted at her boarding house and persons who tried to revive her learned her sex.
She said she had donned men's clothes to aid her in her search for her husband, who disappeared three years ago from Gary, W. Va.

ITALIANS ESTABLISH BASE ON TURKISH COAST

the convention by Rev. J. G. Dickson, the full blood Indian pastor of the Tutuilla church. He dwelt upon the injustice which has been done his race and declared that it is through the medium of the Sunday school that a new type of Indian will be evolved, Indians who will take their places alongside of white people in the duties of citizenship. Mrs. Mary F. Briner also made a very interesting address to the delegates yesterday afternoon, speaking on "Seven Points of a Graded School."
The teacher training banquet held in the St. George Grill shortly after six o'clock and attended by about fifty delegates was an enjoyable affair. Rev. E. W. Warrington of Pilot Rock, presided and, by way of making all acquainted with each other, had each arise and tell name and home. At the banquet the alumni association of the teacher training class was re-organized and Rev. Warrington was chosen president and L. A. Danahur of Portland secretary-treasurer.

Keefe Welcomes Visitors.

The evening session opened in the Methodist church at 7:30 and, following the song service, J. E. Keefe, Jr., representing the city and the commercial association, made a stirring address of welcome, telling the delegates that the work of the Sunday school association is of incalculable value to the business world of a community for, by the training of the youth in the right direction, the moral fibre and the working efficiency of the men are bettered. Rev. J. B. Holmes of the Christian church followed as a representative of the churches, bidding the visitors welcome. Rev. S. W. Seaman of La Grande responded for the convention, expressing the appreciation of the delegates for the cordial hospitality extended to them.

The address of the evening was made by E. C. Knapp of Spokane, who took as his subject, "The Sevenfold Emphasis," declaring that the association worker need to put special emphasis on seven things, namely, worship, instruction, business, evangelism, extension, missions and temperance. Especially did he dwell upon the necessity of the Sunday school emphasizing the virtue of temperance, declaring that the school which failed to do so is not worthy the name.

Steps Are Being Taken to Keep Minister From Electric Chair.
Boston.—The first move to save the life of Clarence V. T. Richeson, the confessed murderer of Miss Avis Linnell, who is sentenced to die in the electric chair during the week of May 19 was made. The former minister's attorney, William A. Morse, had a short conference with Executive Secretary Hamlin at the state house, after which it was announced on April 26, counsel for the condemned man will appear before Governor Foss and argue on the question of referring a petition to the executive council which bests entirely with the governor.

\$10,000 ANNUITY TO TEACH WIFE THE VIOLIN

Bright Prospects for a Little Italian "Find" of the Late Mrs. Joseph Drexel.
Philadelphia.—By the will of Mrs. Joseph Drexel, widow of the banker, an annuity of \$10,000 is provided to continue the musical education of a protegee of hers, Domenico A. Bove, a little Italian lad.
Nine years ago Mrs. Drexel heard the boy and his father, who were itinerant musicians, playing about the streets. Since then she has lavished money upon his tuition under widely known teachers. For four years he has been a student at the Royal Academy of Music in Vienna.
Shortly before her death she financed an elaborate concert abroad at which some of the world's greatest artists were present, and they showered encomiums upon the young player.

Professor Otakar Sevoik, the director of the master school of the Royal Academy and the former teacher of Kukulik, has been secured by the administrators of the estate to complete the musical education of the boy, who gives promise of becoming a great violin virtuoso.

GERMAN BATTLESHIPS WILL VISIT AMERICA

Berlin.—The final composition of the German fleet division to visit America to return the visit of the United States Atlantic fleet last year has been determined upon by the German admiralty. It will include the protected cruiser Moltke, Captain Ritter von Mann Elder von Tschirch; the protected cruiser Statlin, Captain von Krosch; and the protected cruiser Bremen, Captain Seeborn. The rear admiral, who is to be in command of the division, has not yet been selected.
The warships will sail probably early in June. The officers include Lieutenant Prince Henry of Reuss, and Lieutenant Prince Christian of Nossen-Philippsthal-Barchfeld.
Prince Adalbert of Prussia, the son of the emperor, will not go to America.
