

MUTE, BLIND GIRL CAN NOW TALK AND SEE

Under Skillful Treatment Little Katherine Frick Rivals Helen Keller in Recovering Faculties.
Philadelphia.—Deaf, dumb and blind until a short time ago, eleven-year-old Katherine Mary Frick has left this city to pay a visit to her parents in Harrisburg, and to bring joy to their hearts by actually speaking to them in words, she cannot hear and telling them that he sight is so improved that she can now distinguish day from night.

The story of her release from the seemingly impenetrable walls of darkness and silence which her affliction raised around her mind rivals that of Helen Keller in its wonder and exceeds it in rapidity.

For two years the little girl has been a patient in the Pennsylvania Institute for the Deaf and Dumb. When she went there she was the most helpless of mortals. Healthy in body and with a mind that was strong, although absolutely undeveloped, she was barred from all communication with her fellows. Now all is changed. Within these

two years she has been taught to recognize her teacher and her friends by touch, and she can read the raised printing of the blind, she can operate a typewriter, tell what a person is saying by placing her hands upon the speaker's lips, and she can talk with distinctiveness and correctness, although she is not able to hear even the sound of her own voice. An operation has partly lifted the veil from

her eyes and enabled her to see the difference between light and darkness.
