AT THE OREGON THEATRE

"The Squaw Man."

It is not often that our theatre goes such high-class artists as will appear at the Oregon Theatre April 30, and it is hoped the theatre will be crowded to capacity. The newspapers from adjacent cities are high in their praise where "The Squaw Man" has been playing to capacity houses and herewith is reproduced a clipping from the Winnipeg "Free-Press". "Consensus of opinion at the conclusion of the performance given by 'The Squaw Man' company at Walker Theatre last night was by far and away the best seen at the theatre since it was built, and the company is to be heartily congratulated upon having given the most complete satisfaction. The 'Squaw Man' was the title of the play; the story told was powerful and full of human interest, the interpretation given by the artists left nothing to be desired. To single out one artist for special mention would be an invidious proceeding, for the company was well balanced and each one performed his and her allotted task with true and histrionic ability. Utterly devoid of convention or artifice, sometimes more than succession of profoundly realistic scenes transferred from life to the stage. The play proved a vital source of inspiration alike to actor and producer. Hand in hand with the playwright goes the player, both seeking truth and an almost sacred art; both striving to place before the public an unflinching lesson in sincerity and an irresistible appeal to sympathy. Every detail even to the very words the characters exchanged with each other solo voice at the back

of the stage seemed to be scrupulously considered, and the impression was one of refreshing spontaneity. There were many strong situations, and the scenes in the second act, which handled less carefully would have resulted in course burlesque, ascended to the highest of superb melodrama. It was an enjoyable and delightful performance and found favor with a very large audience who witnessed it, which augurs well the engagement of the company."

Big Animal Show Coming.

With the Al G. Barnes Big Three Ring Wild Animal Circus which will give two performances in Pendleton on Tuesday, May 7, there is a herd of elephants which does almost everything with the exception of talking. They operate a barber shop, run a laundry, play ten pins, etc., besides their acrobatic work. Elephants come next to the dog in smartness but it is rather difficult to teach them tricks because of their size.

In learning an elephant to stand up on his hind legs, ropes are attached to each of his fore legs and then attached to a crane high up in the air. At certain words of command they are gently hoisted in the air leaving the elephant supporting himself on his hind legs. This has to be done sometimes as often as fifteen or sixteen times before the huge beast understands what is wanted. But after a while simply from force of habit, he begins to raise himself at the signal. It takes about fourteen men to operate the crane.

Much the same sort of thing is done in teaching him to lie down, only in this case a rope with a slip noose is passed around his body at the small of his back, one hind foot and one fore foot are tied and moved out from under him, and then the ropes are

pulled gently but firmly until he lies down.

An elephant sleeps in a peculiar manner. Nearly all lie on their sides with their trunks curled up, making a peculiar hissing noise at regular intervals, something like the sound of steam issuing from a kettle. The huge beast is not a sound sleeper. He does not take much notice of his keeper prowling around in the night, but should anything strange or unusual take place, two small, red lights appear in the elephant's head, and the animal is wide awake. At the first sign of danger he trumpets shrilly. In the herd of elephants with the Al G. Barnes circuses there are two more than 100 years old.

KILLS DUCKS BY BOOMERANG.

Sportsman Says He Bagged Twelve on Eight Throws.

St. Joseph, Mo.—An American hunter, who carries boomerangs instead of a repeating shotgun, is a curiosity, but Vernon Tantlinger, a local nimrod uses the Australian war weapon when he goes after ducks.
