WANTS GOVERNOR'S VIEWS ON LAND BILL

Washington, April 30.—Secretary of Agriculture James Wilson, having reported that, with some amendments, Senator Chamberlain's bill, S. 578, should pass, the senator has written to Governor West asking him for his views on the subject. The bill provides for adjustment of the claims of the states and territories to lands within the national forests, by authorizing an exchange of such land for other lands of like quality and value.

Commenting on the bill, Secretary Wilson objects that it "proposes fictitious values for the state lands which the department would have to consider in making the exchange of such land for other lands of like quality and value."

The secretary, after commenting rather fully, adds: "I would suggest that all after the word 'provided' in line 13 on page 1 be stricken out and that in lieu thereof the following be inserted: 'That upon completion of the exchange the lands relinquished, reconveyed, or assigned as base lands within the exterior boundaries of National forests shall immediately become a part of the national forests within which they are situated.'"

STATE G. O. P. MEET CALLED AT PORTLAND

Portland, Ore., April 30.—C. W. Nottingham, chairman of the republican state committee, has called a meeting of the committee at the Imperial Hotel at 2 o'clock next Saturday afternoon. Newly-elected members of the state central committee will attend this gathering and assist in effecting a permanent organization by the election of a chairman, secretary and an executive committee.

Mr. Nottingham will submit his resignation as chairman, but speculation as to his successor must be deferred, until the personnel of the organization as it will be made up of representatives from the different counties, has been determined. Many of these members will be chosen by the county organizations this week.

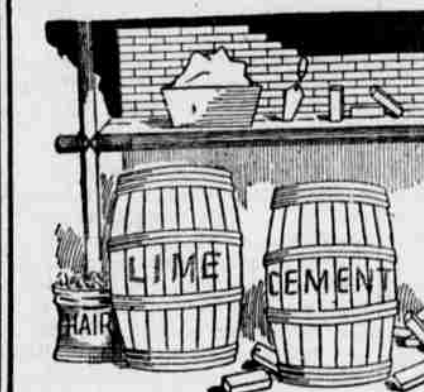
