BARNES' TRAINED ANIMAL CIRCUS IS COMING

Few who see wild animals in cages realize the vast amount of trouble, danger and expense necessary to get them there. The greatest danger lies in capturing the animals in their native country. With the Al G. Barnes Big Three Ring Wild Animal Circus which will give two performances in Pendleton on Tuesday, May 7, there are 350 animals most of which were in the forest and jungles of their native countries.

There is no more ticklish or dangerous task than tracking lions in the vast Nubian deserts. The scorching sun pours down with such force that few men can stand it. The effect on the eyes is blinding. There is little or no shade. The wariest and most careful hunter may be tracking an

animal, and at the same time be tracked by the very animal he is seeking, who may spring on him at any moment.

For capturing full-grown lions large traps of various forms are used. One trap is square, one of the sides lifting up on a spring like the old fashioned mouse trap. This trap is baited with a piece of fresh meat, and as soon as the lion has entered the trap the door shuts down and he is a prisoner. More than a score of the lions with the Al G. Barnes circus were captured in this manner.

Elephants are generally caught in nooses. A number of men surround the elephant after they have previously formed a circle of fire about the beast. The fire gets closer and closer to the elephant and finally a noose is thrown over his head. He is then securely tied to a tree and allowed to remain there until quiet. Tame elephants are then brought in to use and appear to be a sort of persuasive in making the huge animals tractable.

In catching snakes various devices are used. One is to set the grass on fire in a circle where it is known that snakes have hiding places. As they rush out they are caught in large pits mounted on wooden hoops to which is attached a large bag.

YALE'S PREHISTORIC RELIC.

Stone Figure of a Human Being Holding Up a Seat.

New Haven.—Yale University museum has received from Ecuador, South America, an interesting prehistoric relic in the shape of a large stone chair, carved as a couching human being holding up a stone seat. The chair is of a kind of stone found nowhere in the world except on some of the Ecuador hills. The donor is Charles C. Brown, Yale, 1908, who has been living in Ecuador. He was formerly assistant to Secretary Stokes of the Yale corporation.

ITALY CIVILIZING TRIPOLI COUNTRY

(Continued from page 1)

1910 and continued into the fall of 1911. Nothing had been provided under the Turkish regime with which to combat this situation save a single isolation hospital, a municipal hospital and a municipal pharmacy, all in a state of deplorable sanitation themselves, and all practically worthless from a lack of adequate equipment.

A sanitary commission was at once established by the new government and such vigorous measures taken, not only against the epidemic itself but for the establishment of permanent sanitary conditions, that the cholera was entirely stamped out in a very short time. Since then, adequate hospitals with ambulance service have been constructed, chemical and bacteriological laboratories equipped, a pure water supply insured and every precaution and preventive provided for combatting and wiping out the various infectious plagues to which the native population in the past has been subjected.

In the providing along of an adequate pure water supply there was involved the construction of a gigantic reservoir with a capacity of 2000 tons of water, a filtration plant, a steam-pumping station, and the building of aqueducts from the walls of Bu-Meliana to the city of Tripoli. As further safeguards of the public health, this commission now has under way the erection of an immense steam laundry plant and public wash houses for all who care to use them.

The work of this sanitation commission has gone hand in hand with that of the new municipal government which has been established for the city of Tripoli, and in the administration of which many of the natives have been retained. The homeless people of the city were first provided for, thousands being removed from the congested quarters of the city to the oasis where they were provided with food, clothing and farming utensils. Later, many were brought back and established in homes in the districts closest to the city. A service of municipal cleanliness was then installed, including everything from street sweeping up; meat, fish, fruit, vegetable and other markets established; a municipal slaughterhouse provided and also an immense municipal baking plant to insure proper food.

The municipality is now working out a system of public transportation and in a short time there will not only be a street service of horse cars but of automobiles as well. A complete system of public protection has been established with a police system for the city while branches of the Royal Carabinieri have been installed throughout the country. Scores of the former police officials of Tripoli are now enrolled in the Italian police service.

While Italy has thus provided first for the most pressing needs of the people of Tripoli, she has also seen to it that the intellectual development has kept pace with the new material progress. Previous to the actual Italian occupation of Tripoli, the Italian government has already established there schools attended by 1000 natives. These schools worked side by side with those maintained by the various missionaries and attended by 350. In addition, the Turks themselves had established schools, attended by 1250 students, including a military school, and a day and night school which had been the especial provision of the Young Turks' Committee of Union and Progress. Since the actual occupation, Italy has made it possible for these schools to continue under improved conditions, while a special commission is working out the problem of modern school education for the entire country.

All of the charitable institutions that existed before the occupation, or that have been established since, including several maintained by the Jewish residents, have now been placed under the surveillance of the Italian authorities to insure their proper conduct, as well as their future welfare. Side by side with these more urgent necessities for the people themselves, Italy has worked as rapidly as possible for the establishment of those public works most necessary for the material development of the country. Despite the lack of material, labor, transportation and construction facilities, great progress has already been made.
