REACTION IN HOG MARKET, PORTLAND

QUOTATIONS ARE FIVE CENTS LOWER TODAY

Eastern Depression Effects West—No Cattle Received at Stockyards and Trade is Good—Sheep Prices Waver—Wheat Loses.

(From Wednesday's Journal.) There was a reaction of 5c in the price of hogs at North Portland today. Best offerings went at \$8.45 compared with yesterday's tops at \$8.50.

To some extent the fractional loss here is occasioned by the weaker feeling and lower price that has been quoted east of the Rockies. While the market here at present has little in common with South Omaha or other points in the middle West, the bearishness there naturally affects the trade here to a certain extent.

Run of hogs at North Portland today totaled 245 head, compared with 127 last Wednesday and 144 on this same day a year ago.

Wavering prices were shown in the mutton market at North Portland today. There was a run of 522 head this morning, compared with 616 last Wednesday and 577 head on this same day a year ago.

Top lambs continue firm at \$7.50 but stuff that is slightly off is showing considerable shading. The same is true of wethers and ewes, and in both of these lines fractionally lower values are in effect.
