

WEAKNESS SHOWN IN CATTLE MARKET

DROP OF TEN TO FIFTEEN CENTS IS ANTICIPATED Day Starts Off Good, With Reaction Settling in Later—Hogs Are On Decline—Sheep Market Steady—Wheat Down.

(From Thursday's Journal). Cattle market turned weak this afternoon and with only one buyer in the field, and that a local man, lower prices only were available.

There was only a small run of cattle in the local yards early today and the situation is exceedingly good. Some of the stuff that arrived was a direct shipment to a meat company, which maintains its buyers in the country and is therefore not dependent upon the arrivals in the yards.

Total offerings for the day were 77 head, compared with 259 last Thursday and 176 a year ago.

Hog Market Down. The hog market was down another

fraction at North Portland today. Sales of light offerings of quality were made around \$8.40, or 5c below the previous top.

Continued weakness with loss of price at most points east of the Rockies is naturally having its effect upon the home trade. Even on the basis of what killers paid this morning, North Portland swine figures are still 65c above any regular market in the country. While this is less than was shown here during the period when killers were forced to import the bulk of their supplies from the Missouri river country, still the value is better than usually paid when home offerings are sufficient to fill all wants of the trade.

Run of hogs for the day at North Portland showed 305 head, compared with 153 last Thursday, and 574 this day a year ago. Therefore, compared with the run of a year ago, today's showing is a decrease of 269 head.

Sheep Market Juste Steady. There was a fair showing in the sheep trade for the day at North Portland. While some uneasiness was shown at times, the general situation was considered steady and practically no change was made in prices.

Run for the day included 799 head, compared with 1438 last Thursday. A year ago the run was 247 head or 458 head less than today.

Dr. Hewett says that trees are growing out of the roof of the structure, which is in the forest near Quirigua, Guatemala, so long has the palace remained buried. Dr. Hewett will report to the Smithsonian Institute, the Archeological Institute and to the Panama-California Exposition department of archeology all three of which institutions are backing the expedition.
