OUTPLAYED YAKIMA LOSES SECOND GAME

Buckaroos Play Rings Around Apple Pickers and Hand Them, String of Ciphers.

Out pitched, out batted and out fielded, the North Yakima Cubs yesterday afternoon dropped a second shutout game to the Pendleton Buckaroos and seven hundred fans of both genders witnessed the victorious boys. The final score was, Pendleton 11, North Yakima 0.

As Osborne and Garrett had the visiting batters at their mercy on Saturday, so did Hewitt, the southpaw, held them on his hip yesterday and never at any instant was he in danger of losing his game. Twice he got out in a delicate situation, but by masterly twisting, forced the Cublets to watch their chances expire.

Franks, who finished the Saturday game for the Yakimas, opened yesterday's contest and for six innings he was pounded all over the lot. At the end of the sixth, Tyrrell came in from center field to leave the ball but he was unable to stop the bloodthirsty Buckaroos and five more runs came during his session.

Garrett's men again played errorless ball and this combined with the fact that every one of them was hitting the ball, brought exceeding joy to the hearts of the fans and fanettes. Their two games have proved that they are fast rounding into championship shape and developing into a formidable machine.

Story of the Game.

From the way things began, it looked as if the gentlemen from Appleland were on their way to take a few by way of demonstrating their ability to come back. Hewitt grooved his first ball and Rochan, the scrappy little shortstop, lugged it on the nose for a clean single over second.

Next up, sacrificed nearly and Rochan reached the third station on a passed ball. Here it was that the crooked arm twirler tightened up. Higdon fanned and Rochester made the third out when he grounded an easy one to the pitcher. Aside from this chance and the over-fence ball by Rochester in the seventh, which unfortunately did not go for a run because the big catcher failed to step on third, the Yakimas' only other opportunity to score came in the eighth when they got two men on bases by a hit and a pass. Here again Hewitt pitched himself out of a hole by breezing three batters in succession.

The Buckaroos started things right in their opening frame and before the cannonade was hushed, four runners had negotiated the circuit.

Rader, first up, waited for a pass and drew it, whereupon he promptly purloined second. Robinson sent him on to third with a short hit and both men came to the registering pan when Lodell stole second and Nadeau was put on first by a pass. The former was given transportation home by Davolt's single, but Nadeau was caught at the plate when he tried to follow Lodell.

Davolt was forced out at second by Mensor's infield ball, but the little fielder himself was enabled to complete the circuit by the hitting of Kimbroske and Augustus.

Two more scores came in the fifth, due to singles by Lodell and Nadeau, and sacrifice flies by Davolt and Mensor. Another couple was secured in the sixth by virtue of two passes and a hit by Robinson while a third brace was taken in the seventh, due to an error, a pass a hit and a sacrifice while the eleventh was made in the eighth by Robinson, who got to second on an error by the Yakima catcher, was advanced to third by Lodell and registered on a passed ball.

In all the eight innings they wielded the stick, only three of their number died at the plate and the poor horsehide was bruised painfully. With two exceptions, every man of them scored in the hit column and the total number they garnered was eleven. The feature of the game was the heavy hitting of "Curley" Wilson, the clever backstop. Four times at bat, he drove out a three sacker, two doubles and a single and was directly responsible for four of the scores.

Story of the Game. The Yakimas never had a chance from first to last. They began and ended the game with a fan out and, with the exception of the third and sixth innings, never got more than three men up to bat. In these two, they had four up, due to their lone-some hit and a free pass. One other man got on first by the four ball route but was promptly caught off the bag by Wilson's sharp peg to Lodell.

Pendleton started things in the first. After Rader had gone down on a fly ball, Robinson beat out a bunt, stole second, took third when Lodell grounded out, Roshon to Higdon, and came home on a passed ball.

In the second another was taken. Davolt beat out a bunt, was sacrificed to second by Mensor and came to the tally pan when Wilson slammed the pellet over the centerfielder's head.

The third and fourth were blanks although in the latter inning Wilson again smashed the sphere, this time through the fence for three bags.

Two came in the fifth. Osborne started things by driving out a corking single. Rader bunted, beating out the throw, and in the confusion Osborne tore up the paths from first to third and landed safely, Robinson breezed and Lodell laid down a neat bunt for a sacrifice. Osborne reached the plate easily and, Rader, by a desperate slide, followed him in for a score.

The last three were secured in the succeeding inning. Davolt reached first when Mulver heaved a ball over the first baseman's head. Mensor tried to bunt and popped up a little fly which was not caught, and he beat out the throw to first. Davolt going to second. Again Wilson came through for a two sacker, sending in two runs, and he himself was pushed home when Augustus followed his lead and drove out the ball for a double hit.

In the seventh, Franks relieved Marks in the box and, though two hits were made off his delivery, they went for naught in the run column.

349 HIT BY LOCALS IN PRACTICE GAMES

Pitchers Showing Better in Batting Average Column Than Their Teammates.

Now that the practice season for the Buckaroos is over and the team ready to open the schedule with Walla Walla, fans will be interested in how the individual players have shown up at the bat. From the records of the first game with Pilot Rock, the Irish vs. Dutch game and those with Adams, Whitman College and North Yakima, the batting averages have been figured up and they show that the team as a whole has batted .349, a remarkably good average when it is taken into consideration that in three of the games, the players batted against pitchers of their own squad. Another remarkable feature of the figures is the averages of the pitchers. Although sabbasters are not supposed to be able to connect with the ball, three of the Buckaroo twirlers have been stinging the pill for .500 averages, another has batted .400 and fifth has .273 to his credit.
