**PENDLETON TAKES  
3RD TRACK HONORS**

RETURN FROM MEETING  
AT BAKER UNSHAKEN

Annex Twenty-four Points, Fee Leading for Locals, Also Winning Second Place in Oratorical Contest, Baker Man Winning.

With only third place honors, but not at all discouraged by their failure to win the championship, the five man track team of the local high school returned yesterday from Baker where Saturday the annual Eastern Oregon interscholastic track and oratorical meet was held. Baker captured first place and La Grande beat out Pendleton for second.

The local boys annexed 24 points in the meet and were only prevented from taking more, according to Coach Asahr, because of the handicap under which they have been training.

Gordon won the fifty yard dash in five and three-fifths seconds but, after winning with his heat and the finals in this event and placing in the preliminary for the 100 yard sprint, he became deathly sick, though he gamely entered the finals of the 100, he was too weak to take a place.

Fee was the high point winner for Pendleton, taking first place in the discus, second in the shot put and second in the high hurdles. Because of weakness from participation in these events and the fact that the pole vault and high jump followed immediately after these, he failed to place in them. Hampton, however, showed up in splendid form, clearing the bar in the high jump at five feet

four and tying for first place with a Wallowa man. He also made a splendid vault but could not place.

Jordan annexed five points by putting the shot 42 feet 1 1/2 inches, beating Davis, La Grande's star weight man, by nearly five feet. Fee took second in this event with a put of over 39 feet.

Williamson ran a splendid mile but could only come in fourth. There were about twenty entries in this event and the Pendleton boy was crowded well to the rear and was forced to fight for his position to the front. This event was won by Payne, the crack Athena distance man, in the fast time of 5.54. Payne also took third in the half mile.

The day was rather chilly and the track slow, but under the direction of Coach Archie Hahn and Captain Biomquist of Whitman college the meet was pulled off in fine style.

In the oratorical meet in the evening, Fee won second place with his oration "World Peace," and, if the judging had been done on delivery alone, would easily have carried away first honors. As it was the Baker representative beat him out a few points on thought and composition.

**Improves Residence Property.**

**Sues to Recover Horses.**  
J. L. Hammack has commenced suit against J. W. and G. R. Shortridge for the recovery of two horses which he alleges defendants secured under misrepresentation. S. A. Lowell is counsel for the plaintiff.

**Saylor Spent Only \$10**  
S. A. Saylor of Umatilla candidate elect of the republican party for the office of assessor, was the last to file his statement of campaign expenses. His account showed but ten dollars spent, all for the circulation of petitions.

**Finish Shearing of Sheep.**  
The J. E. Smith Livestock company finished the shearing of its flocks at Barnhart yesterday, according to Bert Smith, who was in the city this morning, and will complete the taking of the fleeces at Pilot Rock in a few days.

**Fred Kees Recovering.**  
Relatives of Fred Kees, former clothing salesman of this city, have received word that he is gradually recovering from a paralytic stroke he suffered in Portland some time since. He is now able to walk about though still seriously afflicted.

**Wade Sells Alfalfa Ranch.**  
Through the agency of E. T. Wade, local real estate man, the fine 115 acre alfalfa ranch on McKay creek owned by W. P. Carl has been sold to Henry Koppitke and Earl Gillanders, well known Pendleton fuel dealers, for a consideration of \$10,000 cash.

**Building New Bungalow.**  
Elmer Baer, of the East Oregonian's linotype force, is having a modern, six-room bungalow constructed on the lot adjoining the F. E. Livengood home on the north side of the river. The work is being done by Gibson & Cole and the bungalow when completed will be occupied by Mr. Baer and family.

**Equal Suffrage Club to Meet.**  
There will be a regular meeting of the Political Equality League tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock in the assembly room at the city hall. Some important measures in regard to the local campaign work will be discussed. All league members are asked by Mrs. M. L. Akers, secretary, to be present, and also any others who are interested in Votes for Women.

**Suing for a Divorce.**  
Lizzie Warren today commenced suit against her husband, Charles Warren for a divorce, alleging that since their marriage in Walla Walla in June, 1911, the defendant has abused her and accused her of unbecoming actions of which she was entirely innocent and of which he knew her to be innocent. She also asks for the restoration of her maiden name, of Williamson.

**Police Court Record.**  
This morning was the quietest Monday morning in police court for several months, only one drunk appearing. John Clancy, a Pasco brakeman, was the unfortunate, and he accepted a two day sentence in jail. On Saturday afternoon J. C. Foidbecher, who made a harvest off the Indians by selling cheap jewelry, was arrested for making the sales without a license. He stood trial and was convicted by his own admissions and received a sentence of ten dollars fine or five days in jail. He took the latter alternative.

**Two Helpful Lectures Free.**  
On next Wednesday evening, C. H. Lane assistant in the bureau of agricultural education of the department of agriculture, will make a public address in the city hall and on the following evening, Miss Milam, of the department of domestic science at the Oregon Agricultural college, will speak to the ladies of the city at the same place. Both lectures will be without charge and the public is invited to attend and hear something that will prove of great benefit.

**101 Ranch to Show Here.**  
Pendleton people are to have an opportunity of seeing the greatest traveling wild west show on June 12 by arrangements made today by H. L. Masie, advance man for the 101 Ranch. The show will probably be pulled off in Round-up Park, most of the directors of the Round-up being in favor of extending this courtesy to the great rival of the home frontier carnival. The 101 Ranch is one of the greatest road shows ever gathered together, being fully equal if not better than the Buffalo Bill show.

**Miniature Round-Up Yesterday.**  
The Barney Sherry ranch on the reservation was the scene of another miniature Round-Up yesterday afternoon and many people were there to witness the wild west stunts pulled off. However, this will probably be the last occasion of its kind on a Sunday as a result of the protests made by the congregation of the Indian church at Tutuilla. Yesterday at their meeting, when they noticed that a great many of their younger members had been attracted to the show instead of to church, they sent their missionary, Rev. J. M. Cornelison, to Agent Swartzlander with a solemn protest against any further Sunday celebrations and the agent has promised to take action to prevent a repetition. Many people from Pendleton went out to witness the riding and other stunts and at least one local

citizen is lamenting the fact that he did go. It is none other than Councilman R. F. Kirkpatrick who is hobbling about on crutches as a result of an attempt to bulldog a steer. He threw his steer alright but forgot to get his legs out of the way. Hence, his lameness.

**Train Smashes a Handcar.**  
As the result of a collision Friday night between a west bound freight and a handcar, the members of the Mission section gang are minus a large supply of groceries which they had just purchased and were transporting to their camp. They had come into the city just before six o'clock, had made their purchase and were pumping their way home at a lively clip.
