HIGHER WAGES FOR GIRLS. ANNE MORGAN'S SLOGAN

Daughter of "J. Pierpont" Says She Will Campaign to Compel \$8 Minimum Salary.

New York—Miss Anne Morgan, the energetic daughter of J. Pierpont Morgan, aided with her friends, Miss Elizabeth Marbury and Miss Elsie de Wolfe, to have a good time in Spain, a country that so far has not been visited by the trio in their annual travels abroad.

"That's the only reason we are going there," said Miss Morgan. "We haven't seen Spain, so, instead of going to places we have visited before, we intend to road around and see everything until the fall, when I am coming back to do some hard work."

"What work?" When I get back I am going to see passed by the legislature a minimum wage scale for the female workers. At the present time the wages received by girls in New York are so low that living is out of the question. Some of them receive but \$3 and \$4 a week, and a girl

can't do anything on that. A girl should have at least \$8 a week. "Don't think I am going to fight the employers, because I'm not, I'm just going to show the employers the injustice of the present wage scale, and when they are persuaded what is right the increase in wages will come naturally. I cannot say whether I will form an organization with this object in view, but if such an organization is forced I shall certainly identify myself with it. I hope to get some information on this subject while I am in Europe."

COWBOY COLLEGE HEAD Former Stanford Professor President of Wyoming University.

Cheyenne, Wyo.—Dr. Clyde Augustus Dunaway, president of the University of Montana, was elected president of the University of Wyoming. A score of years ago he was a cowboy in this state. In 1887 he was instructor at Harvard University. During the following eleven years he had the chair of history at Leland Stanford University in California.

NOTICE OF PROPOSALS FOR STREET SPRINKLING FOR THE SEASON OF 1912.

Notice is hereby given that proposals will be received by the Common Council of The City of Pendleton at the office of the City Recorder at the City Hall building until May 15th, 1912, at 5 o'clock p. m., for sprinkling the streets of The City of Pendleton for the season of 1912, the districts to be sprinkled are as follows viz:

District No. 1. All streets on the north side of the Umatilla River.

District No. 2. All streets on the south side of the Umatilla River, west of the east line of Main street, and north of the south line of Webb street.

District No. 3. All streets lying east of a line beginning at the intersection of the east line of Main street with the Umatilla River, thence following the east line of Main street to the south line of Webb street, thence following the south line of Webb street east to the west line of College street, thence following the west line of College street to the south line of Railroad street, thence following the south line of Railroad street east to the termination thereof, thence southerly to the City limits.

District No. 4. All streets south of the south line of Webb street and west of the west line of College street.

The City to furnish sprinkling wagons and water, and the contractor to furnish horses, harness and drivers, and to put up and take down all stand pipes, etc., separate proposals will be received for each district, and no contract will be awarded to any one bidder for more than one district, the hours of sprinkling to be in accordance with the orders of the street committee, all bids shall specify the price per team and man per day of 16 hours, time when teams are not engaged in sprinkling to be deducted, the City reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

EXPOSURE KILLED TITANIC VICTIMS

Halifax.—Exposure and not drowning was responsible for the death of most of the victims of the Titanic disaster, according to a statement made here by the physician of the cable ship Minia. Of 17 bodies recovered by the Minia, 16 died of exposure, hours after the Titanic sank. Water was found in the lungs of but one corpse.

The Minia reported that the bodies were found miles apart and their recovery was possible only through expert navigation, combined with good luck.
