UNENTERED UMATILLA LANDS ARE LISTED

Washington, D. C., May 13.—The secretary of the interior has issued the following public notice in connection with the Umatilla project, Oregon:

In pursuance of the provisions of the reclamation act of June 17, 1902 (32 Stat., 388), notice is hereby given as follows:

1. The following public land farm units remain unentered in the third unit of the Umatilla project, Oregon, viz:

T. 5 N., R. 28 E. Section 26.

W 1-2 SE 1-4 NW 1-4, Farm unit "E."

E 1-2 SE 1-4 NW 1-4, Farm unit "F."

W 1-2 NW 1-4 SW 1-4, Farm Unit "D."

2. The said lands shall hereafter be subject to entry under the provisions of the reclamation act without initial payment of the amount heretofore required at the time of entry of other public land farm units in the third unit of said project, but the charges, time and manner of payment shall be the same as required for lands in private ownership in the said third unit as set forth in the public notice of March 2, 1912, except as otherwise provided herein.

3. All entries hereafter made for any of the lands described whether for lands not heretofore entered or for lands covered by prior entries which have been canceled by relinquishment or otherwise, shall be accompanied by applications for water rights in due form and by all charges for building, operation and maintenance which have heretofore become due and remain unpaid, or which were paid and were not duly assigned in writing. The remaining installments shall become due on the dates and be of the amounts provided for in public notice of March 2, 1912, under the heading "other lands."

COLOMBIA SCHOOLS TEACH U. S. HATRED

Washington.—Training the children of Colombia to hate the United States, the educational authorities of that country have inserted into the official textbook of history used in all public schools the following paragraphs which the pupils are required to learn by heart:

"On the third of November, in the year 1903, Jose M. Obaldia, then Governor of Panama, together with Tomas Arias, Nicanor Obaxio and other less prominent Panamanians, some of whom held public office and all bribed by Yankee gold, proclaimed the republic of Panama, to be made up of what was then the department of Panama, an integral part of the Republic of Panama.

"The United States, whose then president, Theodore Roosevelt, was the soul of the plot, hastened to recognize the fake republic of Panama and to seize the canal zone, each conspirator receiving his share of the bribe money previously agreed upon.

"Making use of its world influence, the United States succeeded in having the new republic recognized by many of the European nations and some American states and abusing its material strength, it prevented Colombia from subduing the traitors, in flagrant violation of its solemn pledge, given in the treaty of 1847-1847, by which the United States undertook to maintain the sovereignty of Colombia over the Isthmus of Panama in exchange for most valuable concessions, so that in violation of the said treaty, the United States committed the blackest and most perfidious act ever committed by any nation in the history of the world."
