Boston, May 13.—Investigation into the mental condition of Rev. C. V. T. Richeson, condemned to die in the electric chair for the murder of his sweetheart, Avis Linnell, was continued today with Doctors Stedman, Frost and Tuttle conducting the examination. Preparations for the electrocution of the unfrocked minister are begun today by the warden of the Charleston state prison. Richeson is to meet death May 19th. The death cell has been put in order, and the electric wires inspected.

### GIRL DOESN'T LIKE JOE; NEVERTHELESS, WEDS HIM

**Fear of Ellis Island Leads Her to Carry Out Marriage Arranged by Parents.**

New York.—Fillmena Taconetta, young and attractive, arrived here from Naples to meet Joseph Petrosino, to whom she was betrothed by her parents. Joseph, who has prospered as a fruit merchant in the fifteen years he has been in New York was at the pier to meet her, and with him were a cousin of Fillmena's and a priest.

The Taconettas and the Petrosinos have been neighbors and close friends in Naples for a long time, and when Fillmena grew up and Joe wrote home and told of his success in this country the parents of both thought it would be desirable for the young people to be married.

Petrosino wrote often to Fillmena, and frequently sent her photographs of himself. Fillmena did not discover until now that all the photographs were taken ten years ago, when Joe, perhaps, was not so stout and his features were more clearly defined.

The girl made the voyage over alone, and showed her disappointment when Joe made himself known. She did not appear to welcome his hearty embrace, and she was not at all inclined to carry out her part of the bargain made by the old folks.

An immigration inspector observed her hesitation and told Fillmena that she must not make up her mind in a hurry, and that if she did not want to marry Joe she could go to Ellis Island, where she would be taken care of until the steamship left for Naples again.

The priest and the cousin talked to the girl, and after a while her face brightened up, and she announced that she was willing to be married.

### COSTS PUT ON POLICEMAN.

**Tables Turned on Prosecutor Who Beat Up His Man.**

Philadelphia, Pa.—A jury in quarter sessions court turned the tables on Policeman William Winkel of the Eighth district, who was the chief witness charging William J. Kirrane with assault and battery. The jury not only acquitted Kirrane, but put the costs, amounting to \$19.80 on the policeman.

According to the testimony, Mabel Schaeffer of Vine street, near Thirteenth, accused Kirrane of having insulted her on the street near her house. She called Winkel when an argument started which terminated by Kirrane going to the hospital after receiving a severe beating from the policeman.

Kirrane testified that instead of insulting the woman, she accosted him on the street, and when he refused to accompany her became angry and summoned Winkel. He said Winkel would listen to no explanation from him, and after using abusive language began striking him.

### PASTOR CLAIMS TO BEING THE CHAMPION HIKER

**Minister Estimates He Has Traveled 18,000 Miles in Six and a Half Years.**

Fayette, Mo.—The Rev. G. M. Walker, who has been preaching in several country churches in Howard county since 1905, is believed to hold the walking record among Missouri's rural clergy. The Rev. Mr. Walker estimates that he has traveled more than 18,000 miles on foot and horseback, principally on foot, in the six and a half years.

During the six and a half years that he has been doing field or missionary work for the Christian church in this county he has made Fayette his home going from six to twenty-five miles to his several country appointments in the corners of Howard and adjoining counties.

A few weeks ago, during a severe blizzard, the clergyman walked fourteen miles from a point in Howard county to Fayette in order to lead a prayer meeting service.

Recently the Rev. Mr. Walker removed his shoes and socks, rolled his pants above his knees and waded Montevideo creek, which was full of floating and melting snow. He was on a twenty-five mile hike to an appointment at Perche church in Boone county.

He was born in Manchester, England, forty-five years ago.

His Christianity is muscular as well as spiritual, and he has won the respect of many young men by his ability to wrestle; in fact he claims to have made at least one conversion by giving a bully a good trouncing.

### MUST LIVE WITH WIFE, ELSE LOSE YOUR VOTE

Philadelphia.—Through a ruling made by the county commissioners of registration approximately 1,600 men all legal voters, will be deprived of their votes because they are separated from their wives.

The commissioners in one case ruled that a man's residence is the place of domicile of his wife, if he is married, and that it is from her abode that he must register.

If this ruling is upheld by the courts it will have the effect of forcing men to go back to their wives from whom they are separated or lose their votes. It has been estimated that there are about 1,600 mismatched couples in Philadelphia and among the men are many prominent politicians.

The case which brought about the ruling was that of William F. Rocke, a local attorney. Rocke is separated from his wife, who resides with their daughter in Germantown, but he wished to vote from a house on North Seventh street. The commissioners ruled that he must vote in Germantown or not at all.
