300 PENDLETON FANS CHEER BUCKAROOS TO VICTORY

Walla Walla series closes with Garretts Men Defeating Bears by Score of 15 to 5.

Walla Walla, Wash., May 13.—After blanking the visitors for six innings in the game on the local grounds Saturday afternoon, Strand blew up in the seventh and allowed the visitors to tie the score, three hits and four errors netting them five runs. In their half of the same canto, however, the Bears forged ahead by securing two runs, finally winning the contest by the score of 15 to 5.

Hewitt, the port-sider, who started the contest on the mound for Pendleton, was yanked in at the end of the fifth by Manager Garrett, Rustemeyer, the tall right-hander taking his place. The latter pitched a much better article of ball than his predecessor but allowed the Bears through hits in the eighth to win the game.

Misses Easy One. With Rader on second and one down, Cushman dropped Lodei's easy fly, allowing the runner to score from second. This misplay seemed to take the heart out of Leonard, the local slab artist and as a result, two more runners tallied in the same inning, on Lodei's steal of second and hits by Nadeau and Mensor.

There was no more scoring by the visitors until the fifth, when after Rader had forced Osborne at second, he scored on Swanson's fumble of Lodei's grounder. Lodei pliffing second and tallying on Nadeau's single which dropped safe, just inside the left field foul line.

In the sixth with one down, singles by Pembroke, Rader and Robinson, together with Augustus' double, netted the visiting team three more runs, while in the eighth, the Buckaroos secured four more tallies on hits by Osborne, Robinson and Lodei, assisted by an error of Martini.

Four more tallies were chalked up in the eighth with hits by Augustus Osborne, and Lodei, together with misplays by Beck and Smith, giving the visitors three runs.

How Locals Scored. The Bears secured their first tally in the first inning on Blackman's single and Brown's slashing drive for two bases. In the fifth the locals came within one of tying the score, Leonard's base on balls, together with two wild pitches by Osborne, and Augustus' error, netting them three runs.

Their fifth and final run they secured in the seventh inning, Leonard drawing free transportation to first, going to third on Mensor's miff of Blackman's fly, and scoring when Rader let Mensor's throw get through him.

Osborne, who defeated the Bears so decisively in Wednesday's contest, did the hurting for the Buckaroos yesterday. Although he was wild at times, his delivery was a puzzle to the locals, who were able to connect with him but four times, two of these hits being made in the first inning while the other two were made in the second and fourth innings respectively.

The loss of yesterday's contest gives Pendleton an even break on the series and makes them tied with Walla

Walla for second place in the league standing.

Artists 10 Years Old Must Draw Landscapes. Difficult Tasks Set for Little Ones Who Aim to Become Famous Painters.

Paris.—An artist of veteran fame, who is also a grandfather, is going to appeal to the French Academy of Fine Arts, of which he is an old member, for the protection of his grandchildren. They are being taught drawing and water-colors at school, and their ages are from 10 to 13 or so.

In the old days they would have been sent to draw a flower-pot or a chair and shade it with a wash or two.

Here are a few of the subjects given to these young artists: "Draw a shepherdess in a field. Express breadth and horizon in the landscape."

"This was for an artist of 10. Another theme" was for boys of 13 or so: "Reception of M. Fallieres at Tunis. Depict the enthusiasm of the crowd."

A third typical subject given to girls of 12 in a drawing and water-color class was: "Paint six episodes in the life of Joan of Arc."

The French Academy of Fine Arts is to be asked to take urgent measures for restraining the imagination and ambition of the art teachers of young Parisian children.

TOWN SUE FOR EPIDEMIC. Coatesville, Pa.—Mrs. B. F. Ruman has instituted suit against the borough for \$15,000 damages because her husband recently died of typhoid fever, and the sheriff will serve the summons on borough officials.

The plaintiff, who has been left a widow, with one son, alleges that her husband enjoyed good health previous to being taken ill with typhoid fever. Aumant was a laborer, 45 years old, and was taken ill in January, and his widow avers that the borough ran sewage into the water mains, and that previous to that her husband was in the enjoyment of good health and physical vigor. It is said that other suits will follow.
