Newsy Notes of Pendleton

Mrs. Young Seriously Ill.

Wants Reservations for Round-Up.

Already Portlanders are making reservations for the Round-Up this fall. This morning Secretary Keefe received a letter from O. K. Jeffery, well known Rose City real estate man, asking that two boxes be reserved in the grandstand and announcing that the North Bank railroad has turned over one of the cars of one of its special trains to him and a party of Multnomah Athletic club members which he is organizing.

Eldridge Buys Imported Stock.

Levi Eldridge, well known stockman, has just purchased the ten head of blooded stallions and mares shipped here from the famous Lakewood Farm of Rock Rapids, Iowa. There were five stallions and five mares in the lot, all two year olds, and Mr. Eldridge declares they are the finest he has seen in this part of the country. F. P. Four Bails Are Forfeited.

Thirty dollars was added to the city's treasury roll this morning when four men arrested Saturday night forfeited bail by non-appearance. E. Bennett and Wild Bennett and Wild Bill tendered a five spot each for being drunk. W. D. Colters was given a jail sentence of two days when he pleaded guilty to having been drunk.

Keefe of the Commercial association is in receipt of a letter from Jaun Balma Hijo, secretary of the Avocados Nurseries in Mexico, in which information relative to lands to be had in this county is asked, the latter stating that many Europeans in Mexico are desirous of moving away from that strife broken country and are casting an eye toward Oregon.

Time to Fix Up Graves.

Councilman John Dyer, who is chairman of the cemetery committee, is calling attention to the fact that Decoration Day is approaching and local people who have relatives and friends buried in Olney cemetery should be fixing their graves in preparation for the occasion. The water has been turned on and each lot will be watered through the season at a cost of four dollars. This price will be charged regardless of whether the owners of lots sign up now or in October. Councilman Dyer also declares that there is much need of work in cutting down the grass and suggests that Friday is a good day for people to turn out to clean up the cemetery.
