POLITICAL STRIFE FATAL.

Mississippi Candidate for United States Senator Killed by Excitement.

Jackson, Miss.—C. H. Alexander, one of Mississippi's foremost lawyers and candidate for the United States Senate in the democratic primary last summer, dropped dead on the street shortly after he had engaged in a spirited factional debate with political antagonist, ex-Governor J. K. Vardaman, on the floor of the democratic convention. Alexander left the convention hall after adjournment apparently in good health and spirits, although he had been vanquished in the contest. On reaching the residence of Dr. Rowland, directly opposite the state house, he fell to the pavement and expired without speaking.
