**SAYS WOMEN'S BRAINS
DO NOT EQUAL MEN'S**

Expert Physician Declares That the Weaker Sex Cannot Hope to Reach Male Level.

Philadelphia.—Dr. Edward Anthony Spitzka, the famous brain expert, after having made a minute examination of hundreds of human brains, declares that woman, as a sex, never will be the equal of man in abstract mental conception.

"In the female brain," said Dr. Spitzka, "the convolutions are broader and of simpler type than in the male brain. Compared with the male brain the female brain is usually characterized by a smaller frontal lobe.

"Each sex has its own part to play in life; any brain difference would be expressive of physiological sexual difference. In the female the percentage of frontal arc is less than the posterior arc. In the male the percentage is about equal. An examination shows no other difference except that the brain of the female is smaller, which may be influenced by the fact that the female frame is smaller.

"While no one will dispute the fact that the individual woman may exceed the average man, it is a fact that in the mass the brains of a woman are smaller and less richly and less completely assured."
