33 YEARS IN PENITENTIARY; IS PARDONED BY GOVERNOR

Two "Lifers" Are Recipients of Leniency at Hands of Chief Executive of Connecticut.

Hartford, Conn.—Contrary to its usual policy, the state board of pardons, of which Governor Simeon E. Baldwin is the head, granted pardons to two life term murderers, one of them being old John Warren, 74 years old, who is the longest confined convict in the country, having entered the state prison at Wethersfield, December 14, 1859, for the murder of his wife, two years before the civil war. The other lifer pardoned is John Hawley, a Bridgeport negro who was imprisoned October 7, 1892, for the murder of his wife, Mary Munson, who Hawley's sister's death had confession recently proved to have been shot and beat to death by Hawley's jealous friends.

Warren will leave the prison walls and will be a care for the rest of his days to his brother, Joel Warren of Mansfield. His case is well known, though the crime happened more than a half century ago when he was a young man of 21. He was enamored with another woman and tried to rid himself of his bride, whom he held under the waters of Roaring Brook in Willington until the bubbles ceased to gurgle. The body was found in the bushes and Warren was sentenced to life after he had confessed and had agreed to plead guilty.

SUGAR TRUST MEN IMMUNE.

Escape Prosecution by Agreeing to Testify Against Others Over Frauds.

Philadelphia.—The American Sugar Refining company, of which George H. Frazier of this city is a director, has returned to the government about \$500,000 to escape further government prosecution, but there has been a tentative agreement that the leading spirits in the sugar trust will reveal their dealings with employees of the government, weighers and checkers.

These men are to be punished, but the representatives of the sugar trust are to go free in return for their testimony.

Not only will government employees be implicated in the frauds, but several men rated as wealthy will be arrested. These men are connected with an independent refinery which has antagonized the sugar trust. Sugar trust men declare they have reaped the benefits from the frauds and have given evidence against the officers of the American company for doing the thing by which they profited.
