**Gives Chaps as Circus Prize.**

The proprietors today announced that they would present an eighteen dollar pair of chaps, made to order, to the winner of the half mile running race at the circus.

**To Run Combine With Gasoline.**

**Scene Shifting in Darkness Angers Paris Theater-Goers.**  
Paris—The performance of Wagner's "Rheingold" at the Paris opera was enlivened by protests from the audience. Felix Weingartner, who had been engaged to conduct the ring series, persuaded the management, Messager & Broussan, to follow the Beyreuth custom of having the scenes changed in darkness or behind a veil of steam, imitating clouds. The noise made on the stage covered that made by the orchestra. A couple of scene shifters during the interlude between the second and third acts, started quarreling, and they used language neither soft toned nor parliamentary. Then the audience took a hand and produced a symphony that Wagner never could have rivaled—a symphony of whistling, catcalls, cries of "Shameful!" "That's enough!" and "Turn them out!"

### AVIATOR WINS \$10,000 PRIZE

**Roland Garros, in Moisant Monoplane Beats Fifteen Rivals.**  
Angers.—Roland Garros, the French aviator, won the grand prize of aviation. The prize was given by the French Aero club and is worth \$10,000.

The distance covered was 583 miles and the aviator had to complete seven times the triangle formed by the three towns, the distance to be covered being about 292 3-4 miles. The prizes are two equal amounts of \$5,000 each.

### AUTO SPEEDER, FEARING JAIL, SENTENCE COMMITS SUICIDE

**Former Saloon Keeper in Minneapolis Drinks Poison When He Hears Judge Will No Longer Fine Him.**  
Minneapolis, Minn.—Fear that he would be sentenced to the workhouse for ninety days is believed by city officials to have been the motive for the suicide by poison of Peter Blar, an old-time Minneapolis saloon-keeper, hotel and theater proprietor. Blar, who has been in court numerous times for speeding his automobile, was to have appeared for sentence, having been convicted by a jury of driving his car while intoxicated. It was rumored at the city hall that because of trouble in the past by Blar, Municipal Judge Leary contemplated sending him to the workhouse for ninety days.
