BUCKAROOS TURN CITY INTO FRONTIER POST FOR NIGHT

The way the Pendleton Elks showed visitors and Portlanders what the "Golden West" was like in former days, at the reunion of the antlered herd in the Rose City, is thus described in the Portland Journal of yesterday:

Civilized Portland was transformed for a few hours last night into the frontier of civilization. Its paved streets became the range of the Indian and the cowboy. Its marble halls were as the wickiups of the passing red men, celebrating a last stand before the whites.

Portland, and especially the horde of strangers within its hospitable gates, enjoyed the show immensely, and this morning everybody's talking about it.

Pendleton's big delegation was the cause of it all, and the cowboy band, the "buckaroos" and the "Indians," who ordinarily are some of the town's most prominent citizens, took active part in the festivities. With music, war hoops and Indian dances, the jolly bunch paraded the streets, serenaded the hotels and entered the leading hostilities of the city, horses and all.

As an added feature and much to the surprise of the great crowd of merry-makers who followed them about the streets and were prepared for almost anything, Sheriff "Til" Taylor of Umatilla county, and president of the "Round-up," and George Peringer, a prominent wheat grower of Pendleton, rode their horses into the elevator at the Elks' club and were hoisted to the third floor. There they rode their horses into the reception room and gave an impromptu program. Jack Keefe, secretary of the Pendleton Commercial club, and an interesting vaudeville performer, added much to the merriment of the entertainment.

Ride Horses Into Hotel. At the Imperial hotel, Sheriff Taylor, George Peringer, "Bill" Ferguson, wheat man, W. R. "Jinks" Taylor, brother of the sheriff, and D. J. Clark, livestock agent for the O-W. R. & N. company, rode their horses down the steps into the bar room. On the main floor the horses were given a "drink" at the bar. At the Multnomah hotel the horses cantered into the big lobby as though it were nothing new for them and then at the Portland hotel they walked down the stairs into the grill, with the surefootedness of the range and mountain cow ponies.

Together with the "buckaroos" were a band of whooping "Indians," in war paint and feathers, among them being Mark Moorhouse, Marshall Spell, Gail Sturdivant, Dr. H. W. Lytle, Roy Alexander, Jim Estes, Cress and Jim Sturgis, Jack Dozier, Oscar Mohler, George Strand, deputy sheriff, and Willard Bond. At each stopping place the "war dance" and "war whoop" was given with startling realism, which was added to by tom-tom music furnished by Charley Van Pelt, Francis McFarland and Leo Sampson, three real Umatilla Indians brought down by the steamer.

It was a wonderful show. It would be counted wonderful if seen on the range. Witnessed as it was last night in the heart of a great city thronged with thousands of merry-makers, it was something to be remembered for a lifetime.

There were features of the impromptu celebration too, which the onlooker could not see nor appreciate. To the "buckaroos" themselves they are the significant details of the showing. Among the 286 head of horses brought from Pendleton in a special train, there were 36 head of genuine Indian spotted horses. To the layman this probably doesn't mean much, but the man who has lived among the Indians and knows their ways, has learned that to an Indian a spotted horse is just as important as a spotted man. It is an engagement right is to a white woman. To get these horses the Pendleton boys had to enlist the aid of friendly Indians and had to coax and promise and even threaten to induce the owners to let the horses go for even a few days.

Bonnets Valuable Beyond Price. The Indian war bonnets and some of the clothes brought by the delegation are valuable beyond price to their owners. The war bonnets decorated with real eagle feathers, the quills turned and tipped with horsehair as only the Indian can do it, are growing scarcer every day, and the Indians as well as the white men who have them among their collections, are hoarding them almost secretly.

Besides the horses in the Pendleton section of the parade yesterday were 39 mules and a burro. This included "Jinks" Taylor's pack of 12 mules and a bell mare, and the famous bucking horses, "Long Tom," "Sunfish Molly," "Lightfoot" and "Hotfoot." Long Tom, the Pendleton boy says, has never been ridden "clean," that is to say, with one hand on the bridle rein and the other hand free.

Carload of Trappings Brought. The delegation also brought an automobile carful of saddles, chaps, spurs and trappings, and every item of the furnishings as well as the livestock, was insured before leaving. The Pendleton boys, all most modest regarding their own personalities and their part in the success of the showing, give much credit to Elmer ("Horse milk") Turner, who though not an Elk himself, worked long and hard in assisting in getting the exhibition together, and in taking care of the shipment and care of the livestock. Besides being a "buckaroo" of some prominence, Mr. Turner is counted the best all around baseball "rooster" in Umatilla county, and what he doesn't know about horses, they say, wouldn't make any kind of a story.

P. C. Sperry, chairman of the 1912 committee of Pendleton lodge No. 288, and Thomas Fitz Gerald, secretary, came down early in the week to make arrangements for headquarters and attend to details of the showing in the parade. They were accompanied by R. V. Ritner, manager of the "Round-up," who assisted in the work and made himself generally useful.

YOUTH FINDS DODGING LAW TOO STRENUOUS
Kept Out of Reach of Officers Five Years and Then Surrenders.

St. Louis.—Five years of solitary exile, every moment filled with the mingled fear that he would be captured by officers of the law, and the longing to return to his aged mother in New Orleans, La., were ended for Rudolph Davis, twenty-four years old, when he surrendered to Sergeant Wade Mathews of the Central police station and said he was wanted in the Crescent City for stealing diamonds and money to the value of \$500.

Davis told the officer he was anxious to return to New Orleans and pay the penalty of his transgressions. He waived extradition.

While a boy nineteen years old Davis was employed as a bartender, he said. His mother had admonished him against drinking, but one day he imbibed too freely and went home intoxicated. He feared the reproaches of his parents, and to escape he took the money and jewels belonging to his landlady.

He left the city and since that time has wandered aimlessly through Louisiana, Arkansas, Mississippi, Missouri and Illinois. A reward was offered for his capture, and he was compelled to be on his guard continually to avoid the officers. He was unable to accept employment at his calling of bartender for fear of being recognized and was compelled to eke out a livelihood at the hardest manual labor.

"I wrote to my mother the other day from Mounds, Ill., telling her she could expect to see me soon," he said.

"Then I came here to surrender. It has been a dog's life. These five years I have wished time and again I was in prison paying the penalty for my crime.

"It is the only wrong I ever committed and it will be the last. I will pay the penalty demanded by the law and I will then start over. It is terrible, but this is the first time I have felt easy in the whole five years. It is a relief not to be compelled to be dodging the police all the time. I will ask the judge for clemency, but whether or not that is granted, I will pay the price and try to make a man of myself for the sake of my mother and for myself."

GAMBLERS GO TO CHURCH.
Corralled on Sunday, They Are Forced to Attend Services.

Muskogee, Okla.—Chief of Police "Joe" Depew has found a new and effective way of punishing gamblers and the frequenters of gambling houses. He forces them to go to church.

The first time this was tried the offenders did not know what to make of it. A patrol wagon rushed out and got a full load, which was backed up to the First Christian church. Officers marched the men into church and ordered them to take seats and remain quiet and orderly during the service. Then another load was hauled, followed by others until all the gamblers to be found in that town were in church.

The congregation politely paid no embarrassing attention to the unexpected members of the audience and as soon as the benediction had been pronounced at a signal given to the gamblers indicating the punishment was over, they quietly filed out of church.

Police Judge Edward Williams proposes to co-operate with Chief Depew and substitute ten Sundays in church for ten days on the rock pile.
