BEWARE BABY TALK.

Just As Bad As Colic, Says Professor at University of Oregon.

University of Oregon, Eugene.—That baby talk is as bad as the colic, was one of the startling views in which Dr. A. R. Berle, professor of Applied Christianity at Tufts college, Cambridge, drove home the facts he was giving in his lectures on "Education" at the University of Oregon the past two weeks. He explained that colic, if allowed to continue, would develop into chronic dyspepsia, and "baby talk," if not corrected, would become a fixed habit with the child that would be a constant source of possible embarrassment in later life.

Dr. Berle's principal plea was for more intensive education of children, and to tend that the greatest amount of knowledge might be acquired during the early, plastic years of a child's life, leaving the later years for accomplishment in the realms of original research.

"STARVING" WITH \$1430.

Woman Fooled Police Samaritans Until Matron Searched Her.

New York.—Policeman O'Brien found a woman lying almost in a stupor in a doorway on Graham avenue, Williamsburg.

"I am starving," said she faintly. "I have had no food for two days. I have no home and no friends."

O'Brien sent the woman to the station, where she sank exhausted into a chair. The reserves sent for a meal which she ate ravenously. She said she was Miss Anna Werschof, 35 years old, and had been in this country only a few years. She asked to be sent to the almshouse.

Before sending her to Manhattan Avenue court the matron searched her. In one stocking was found a bank book showing she had \$1400 on deposit in the Bowers Savings bank. Thirty \$1 bills were found in the other stocking.

AMERICAN GIRL TO BE THE PREMIER DANSEUSE

New York.—To beautiful Eva Swain, the 15-year-old daughter of Edgar Swain, a retired lawyer, living at 314 West One Hundred and Seventh street, has gone the honor of becoming the first American prima ballerina at the Metropolitan Opera House.

At the graduation exercises of the Ballet School of the Metropolitan, conducted by Madame Malvina Cavalazzi, it was announced that Director Gatti-Casazza had chosen this lithe-limbed young girl from among two or three hundred applicants from all over Europe to be the premiere danseuse during the opera season next year.

What is all the more remarkable, she has studied only three years, yet can execute with delicate gracefulness all the movements of Pavlova, even her famous pas a deux, which was Miss Swain's theme at the graduation exercises.

KICKS WOMAN IN FACE.

Pet Horse on Romo Uses Heels With Terrible Effect When Angered.

NEAR PANIC AT LUNA PARK.

Coney Island Fire Causes Great Excitement Among Crowds.

Coney Island, N. Y.—A fire which started in "The Gragoon's Gorge," one of the side shows in Luna Park, caused great excitement among the large crowds of pleasure seekers in the park. The blaze, however, was extinguished before any considerable damage had been done. The side show resumed operations after the fire had been put out.

HOUSEWIVES ARE ECHEATED.

How Pittsburg Dealers Robbed Customers in Fruit and Vegetables.

Pittsburg.—Two schemes that dealers in Pittsburg had been using successfully on the ultimate consumer have been exposed.

The unique scheme was the heavy bandaging of the left forefinger. This the dealer would stick into his measure and then pour in the fruits or vegetables, the bandaged finger taking more space than a false bottom. The finger was used to excite sympathy and this sign of affliction induced purchases to make no complaint.

The inspectors had received a tip on this scheme and inquired of the dealer the nature of his injury.

"I cut it badly," he said.

The inspectors made him take off the bandage. The finger was not injured.

The other scheme was nailing potatoes to the bottom of a peck-measure. Very large potatoes were nailed to the bottom and when the dealer empties his peck of potatoes into a sack or basket he would manipulate it so that the purchaser could not see the bottom of the measure, nor know he was being cheated.

The dealers were warned to quit such practices. They will be arrested if caught a second time.

Washington.—Gross frauds and violations of law in the exercise of the "milling in transit privileges" accorded to shippers, principally in grain, grain products and lumber, have been revealed by the interstate commerce

commission's extensive investigation on that subject just completed. Railroads will be required to establish drastic regulations to safeguard the operation of the privileges in the future.

Some carriers have attempted to conform to transit regulations previously made by the commission, while others have practically ignored them, says the commission, thus creating a condition of great inequality in the handling of grain and its products.

The rules laid down for policing of transit privileges on grain and grain products cover the situation exhaustively and are required to be established by the carriers by August 15 and to be maintained for at least two years.

Sacramento.—A head-on collision between railroad locomotives is one of the amusement features for the September State fair now being planned by the committee in charge of attractions. The committee in charge will try to secure the engineer from the Southern Pacific and stage the event on a half mile track in the infield at Agricultural park.

GIVES SEA TRIP FOR 5 CENTS.

New York to Carry Persons Fourteen Miles on Ferry Boats.

New York.—As the result of an arrangement made by the city department of docks and ferries, tenement dwellers in downtown New York will be able to take a fourteen-mile sea trip on any hot summer day at a cost of only 5 cents each. Five times each day one of the biggest and newest municipal ferry boats will make the excursion.

DIVING BOYS FIND DEAD MAN.

Body of George Beckey Discovered in Moline Swapping Tank.

Moline, Ill.—The body of George Beckey was found on the bottom of the Moline Y. M. C. A. swimming pool by boys diving. The body was lying in seven feet of water when the boys struck against it. Beckey was married and the father of a 2-week-old child. His body apparently had been in the water several hours. No one had seen Beckey near the swimming pool and the circumstances surrounding the drowning are unknown.
