Roads Explain Trunk Limit.

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 13.—General baggage agents have gathered here today to prepare a statement covering the proposed limitation in the length of trunks to be presented to the Interstate commerce commission, which has suspended the rules adopted by roads for this purpose.

In Canada the proposition has been sanctioned by the Dominion railroad commission to place discriminatory charges on all trunks more than 45 inches long. Roads in the United States hope to make the regulation effective by next November 1.

HUSBAND KNIFED FOR RESENTING 'CHICKEN'

Ralph Shively Stabbed, Wife Beaten With Brick in Fight With Trio in Street—Aldermen Capture Assailants.

Chicago.—"There's some classy chicken."

The remark, made by one of three men in referring to a woman who was passing with her husband, resulted in a fight in which the husband was stabbed, the wife was beaten over the head with a brick and the three assailants were captured and arrested by two aldermen after a chase for several blocks.

Aldermen Victor J. Schaeffer and John H. Pauler of the Twenty-Second ward were the heroes of the battle. The three men were each fined \$25 and costs by Municipal Judge Williams in the Chicago avenue court on charges of disorderly conduct.

Husband Resents Attack.
The victims were Ralph Shively, 524 West North avenue, and Mrs. Shively. They were passing the corner of West North and Cleveland avenues when they noticed three men loitering near a building. The men were Andrew Teufel, 625 West North avenue; Frank Becker, 1325 Larabee street, and Conrad Schneider, 1827 Dayton street.

Suddenly one of the men was heard to shout, "There's some classy chicken."

Shively went over and demanded that the men apologize. All three, he said set upon him and he was stabbed three times in the back. Mrs. Shively went to her husband's assistance and was struck on the head with a brick.

The two aldermen were seated near a window in Bauer's residence, 515 West North avenue, and they said they saw the attack. They immediately ran to Shively's assistance, but before they could reach the corner the three assailants ran. The aldermen gave chase. After a run of several blocks the men stopped and surrendered.

It was found that neither of Shively's injuries were serious and after they had been treated at a physician's office they went home. Both appeared in court to press their charges. One of Shively's eyes was discolored and his wife was badly bruised about the head and face. The aldermen did not appear in court.

GEORGIA JUDGE IS AFRAID TO DISEMBARK IN BOSTON

Boston, Mass.—United States District Judge Emory Speer of Macon, Ga., arrived in Boston on the City of Memphis from Savannah. When asked regarding the accusations made against him by Colonel W. A. Huff, former mayor of Macon, for which the judge ordered Huff's arrest for contempt, Speer said:

"You will have to excuse me. This case is before the court at present and I can not discuss it."

It was reported on the water front that Judge Speer feared an attempt on his life and remained aboard all night rather than take a chance at landing at a late hour. It was known that he left his own city under the protection of United States deputy marshals.

DUKE OF CONNAUGHT TO VISIT EDMONTON

Edmonton, Alta.—When the duke of Connaught, governor general of the Dominion of Canada, arrives in Edmonton the morning of Sept. 3, the new parliament building erected at a cost of \$1,500,000, will be in readiness for occupancy. His royal highness will remain in Edmonton until the night of September 4th. One of the functions in his honor will be the governor's ball, for which invitations will be issued in a few days. Mayor George S. Armstrong is arranging for street decorations. Edmonton will be in gala attire during the governor's stay and the representative of the crown will be received and entertained by officials of the city and province. The duke will make a short stay at Red Deer on September 5, arriving at Calgary the same afternoon, going thence to Gleichen on September 7, to officially open the irrigation works near that town. Afterward he will visit Macleod, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat and four British Columbia.

POURS ACID ON BREAD.

Man Has Unique Revenge on Baker But Pays \$10 Fine.

Chicago.—After pouring carbolic acid and iodine over a stock of bakery goods to revenge himself, Jacob Cohen, 612 Maxwell street was fined \$10 and costs by Municipal Judge Seully.

Cohen quarrel with Louis Becker, a baker at 841 Maxwell street, nearly a month ago. Following this he was very bitter, according to Becker.

When Becker left his wagon back of his store, Cohen went to it and covered the goods with poison. When he was captured by Detective Bywater and Deasy of the Maxwell street station a bottle of carbolic acid was found in his clothing.

MORE COMPLAINTS FOR COMMERCE COMMISSION

Washington, Aug. 13.—The new rates of the Gould lines granting reductions on grain from upper and lower Missouri river points, through Kansas City to New Orleans, which go into effect today, are the cause of new complaints to the Interstate commerce commission by shippers of Baltimore. It is claimed that the reductions are made for the purpose of diverting export shipments that are ordinarily shipped through New York, Philadelphia and Boston. The complaints are made through the export committee of the Central Freight association.

SEA VIEW ADVERTISED PROVES TO BE ON THE FENCE IN BACK YARD.

Atlantic City, N. J.—Paul C. Rosecrans, proprietor of the Hotel Lexington, Arkansas avenue and Pacific was held under \$300 bail for the grand jury by Magistrate Jagmetty on the charge of securing money under false pretenses. The complainants were Miss Hernetta Eisenberg and Miss Minnie Goldsmith of New York, who testified in court that he fled from them by fake advertisements. According to the testimony, Rosecrans advertised a full view of the ocean and board walk from his rooms. The girls declared both the ocean and boardwalk were painted on the fence in his back yard, and "he had the nerve to point them out to us," declared Miss Eisenberg.

The girls produced booklets in which Rosecrans went into raptures over the tennis courts and golf grounds adjacent to the hotel.

The hotel is a square from the board walk and to get to the ocean by the "private entrance" it was necessary to cut over back lots and walk under amusement places. Rosecrans entered a plea of not guilty. He will have to go before the grand jury, however.

American Riflemen Coming.
