## LIVESTOCK TRADE IS UNCHANGED TUESDAY

(From Tuesday's Journal.)

There was scarcely enough stuff in the yards at North Portland today to work any decided change in the former situation. Even the stuff that came forward was not of top quality, therefore in no line were extreme values given any semblance of a test.

Total cattle offerings were 115 head compared with 166 a week ago, 379 a year ago, and 368 head this same day two years ago.

## Machine company of 80-82 West Lake street, which charged he bought a typewriter and disappeared without paying for it. The "count's" refusal to abide by the advice of his first counsel, Paul J. Tommanzy of Gary caused him to be placed under parole.

### Gets Another Lawyer.

Tommanzy had advised the "count" to make good the amount involved and officials of the company had agreed to drop the prosecution if this were done. In court the "count" dismissed the lawyer and retained Bernard Cooper. When the case was called, Cooper addressed the court, declaring that the "count" had been fleeced out of \$25.

"These men told the defendant that he would be thrown into jail unless he paid them \$100," Cooper said. "He has not been treated fairly."

"I was willing to let this case drop without a hearing," said Benjamin D. Simon, representing the complaint, "but now I ask that this defendant be punished."

### Placed Under Parole.

"The defendant is ordered placed under parole for a year," said the court. "He will report once a month as to his behavior."

"Count" Orloff denied he intended any wrongdoing.

"I intended to pay for the typewriter," he said. "After I bought it I went to Wisconsin, leaving it in a studio. When I returned the machine had been stolen. I did not want to notify the company until after I was married, when I intended to pay for the machine."

"Countess" Orloff did not appear in court.
