Mrs. Charles Stype and Mrs. Charles Greulich left Thursday by auto for Walla Walla to spend a few days at the fair in that city.

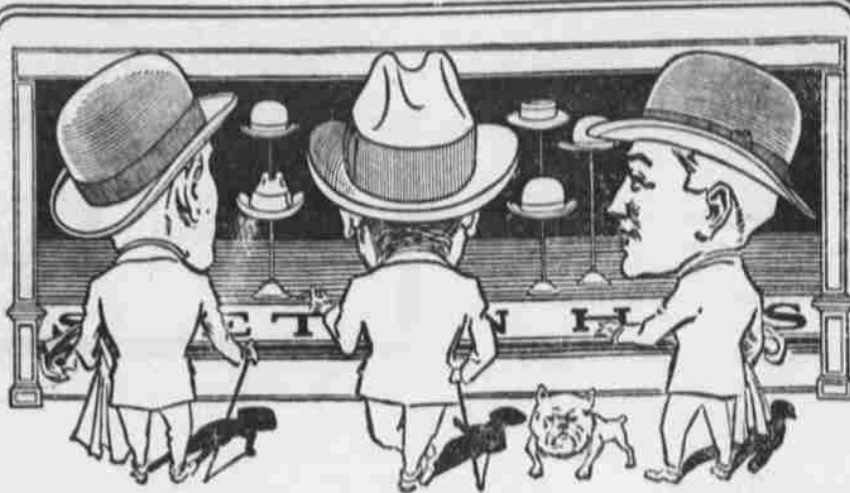
