Whereas, the Council has examined such plans and specifications and found the same satisfactory and the estimates therefor to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work;

Resolved, that the property recommended by the City Surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited is, in the judgment of the Council, properly to be included within such improvement district, and no property is excluded therefrom which should properly be included therein;

Whereas, the improvements of the hereinabove described portion of said Jackson Street with gravel bitulithic pavement is at this time necessary; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Common Council of the City of Pendleton that it is expedient to improve said Jackson Street from the West line of Main Street to the East line of Blaine Street, by paving the same with gravel bitulithic pavement, such pavement to be made and laid down, and the Street to have curbs and gutters and all other things and to be improved, in accordance with, and as shown in, the plans and specifications for the improvements of said portion of Jackson Street prepared by Geary Kimbrell, City Surveyor, and filed with the City Recorder on the 11th day of September, 1912, which plans and specifications are hereby particularly referred to; and be it further

Resolved, that the plans and specifications and estimates for such improvements as prepared by the City Surveyor and filed with the Recorder of the City of Pendleton on the 4th day of September, 1912, be and they are hereby approved and adopted; and be it further

Resolved, that the cost of making such improvements shall be a charge and lien upon all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvements and the owners of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land, shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof; and be it further

HOG QUOTATIONS DROP IN PORTLAND.

(From Friday's Journal.)

Portland broke some records today, but they were not of the kind that stockraisers desire to see. From its proud position as paying the highest price for hogs in the entire country, the record was given to Chicago today and even Kansas City was above North Portland in prices. Omaha was only 15c lower than this market at its best, or about a dime under on the average.

The trade here is getting more hogs than it needs. The country is producing more hogs than the trade can take care of without demoralizing values. This is indicated by the sharp losses in price whenever there is a special amount of stuff available.

Top hogs were \$8.65 in the North Portland markets, showing a sheer drop of about \$1.35 loss for the week to date. This is the greatest decline shown in the entire country and shows that the trade here is not able to take care of a good run when it is available.

There is no mistaking the signs of the times in the North Portland market during the past few days. Killers say that they would be able to get their requirements without paying previous values and by sharp cuts they beat the market down faster than ever before known in any American market, at least within recent years.

SISTER ALOYSIUS UNDERGOES ORDEAL

Tacoma, Wash., Sept. 21.—Rather than allow what was termed "a most vicious attack against the character of Sister Aloysius" to go to the jury unfettered, Attorney Kane, representing the defense in the \$40,000 action for damages against prominent Catholics, declared yesterday he would subpoena the entire town of Buckley, Wash., to testify as to the character and reputation of the sister and her parents, Sister Aloysius, with Bishop Edward J. O'Dea, Father George C. Van Goethen, Mother Superior Camille and Attorney Louis L. Lefevre is alleged by Mrs. Lizzie Magnuson, plaintiff, to have been instrumental in the kidnapping of her daughter, Marjorie Rieman.

Overruling the objection of plaintiff's attorney Kelly, Judge E. M. Card yesterday morning permitted the testimony of several witnesses brought here from Buckley, where the mother and father of Sister Aloysius reside, to tell what they know of the character of the young sister and her parents. Dr. John H. Sheets, for 23 years physician for the family of Michael McHugh, father of Sister Aloysius, whose true name is Agnes McHugh, said the character and reputation of both parents and child in the community of Buckley had always been very good. He was questioned particularly as to his knowledge of degeneracy, and as to whether or not it was hereditary. He replied that usually it was, but that infrequently it was due to environment of the child. When Attorney Kelly objected to testimony being introduced to show the character of Sister Aloysius and her parents, Attorney Kane leaped to his feet and in a tone shaking with indignation said:

"The character of this little sister has been submitted to a most vicious attack. She has been singled out as the one person who by her actions and association with Marjorie Rieman, lured her from her mother. If necessary we want to bring the whole town of Buckley to this court to show her reputation and character from her birth to the present time."

Judge Card stated that there was some doubt in his mind as to the admissibility of testimony of this kind, but that he would rather lean towards the sister and allow her a chance to defend her character. He said, however, he could allow but four witnesses for this particular subject.

John P. Jones, who said he had known Mike McHugh and his daughter for 16 years during his residence in Buckley, testified that the character of both parents and the girl and their reputation had always been the very best. William O. Kempinski, a druggist, was of the same mind.

When placed on the stand Thursday afternoon, Sister Aloysius said: "I have treated Marjorie as a mother would treat a child who is heart-sick."

She emphatically denied having ever exerted any influence over the girl, the tendency of which was to estrange her from her mother, Mrs. Magnuson.

Mother Camille, another of the defendants sat through the session of court reading from a book of prayers, her lips moving perceptibly. The usual crowd of women and girls was in attendance.

Lefevre is alleged by Mrs. Lizzie Magnuson, plaintiff, to have been instrumental in the kidnapping of her daughter, Marjorie Rieman.

Overruling the objection of plaintiff's attorney Kelly, Judge E. M. Card yesterday morning permitted the testimony of several witnesses brought here from Buckley, where the mother and father of Sister Aloysius reside, to tell what they know of the character of the young sister and her parents. Dr. John H. Sheets, for 23 years physician for the family of Michael McHugh, father of Sister Aloysius, whose true name is Agnes McHugh, said the character and reputation of both parents and child in the community of Buckley had always been very good. He was questioned particularly as to his knowledge of degeneracy, and as to whether or not it was hereditary. He replied that usually it was, but that infrequently it was due to environment of the child. When Attorney Kelly objected to testimony being introduced to show the character of Sister Aloysius and her parents, Attorney Kane leaped to his feet and in a tone shaking with indignation said:

"The character of this little sister has been submitted to a most vicious attack. She has been singled out as the one person who by her actions and association with Marjorie Rieman, lured her from her mother. If necessary we want to bring the whole town of Buckley to this court to show her reputation and character from her birth to the present time."

Judge Card stated that there was some doubt in his mind as to the admissibility of testimony of this kind, but that he would rather lean towards the sister and allow her a chance to defend her character. He said, however, he could allow but four witnesses for this particular subject.

John P. Jones, who said he had known Mike McHugh and his daughter for 16 years during his residence in Buckley, testified that the character of both parents and the girl and their reputation had always been the very best. William O. Kempinski, a druggist, was of the same mind.

When placed on the stand Thursday afternoon, Sister Aloysius said: "I have treated Marjorie as a mother would treat a child who is heart-sick."

She emphatically denied having ever exerted any influence over the girl, the tendency of which was to estrange her from her mother, Mrs. Magnuson.

Mother Camille, another of the defendants sat through the session of court reading from a book of prayers, her lips moving perceptibly. The usual crowd of women and girls was in attendance.
