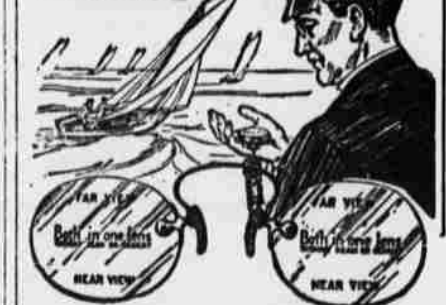
"THE COWBOY QUEEN."
