GIRL TELLS STORY OF ALL NIGHT RIDE

Oregon City, Ore., Oct. 21.—Cool and collected, almost to the point of defiance, Clara Johnson, a slip of a girl, sat in the witness chair before a coroner's jury Saturday and told the story of the all-night automobile ride to Portland, which was followed by the suicide of her companion and friend, 14 year old Valerie Proffitt.

Her story was pathetic, made doubly so by her youth and the youth of the others concerned. Her statements were punctuated by a hacking cough, contracted on her night's outing, but she displayed little emotion except when stoutly defending her reputation and the reputation of her companion.

Miss Johnson is 16 years old. Her testimony tended to exonerate Harry Timmons and Johnny Finucane from any suspicion of having been unduly intimate with her or Miss Proffitt during the trip. Corroborative testimony was given in a straightforward way by the boys themselves, and by Dr. Guy Mount, who performed an autopsy on the body of the dead girl.

Perhaps a Plan to Scare Mother.
Fear of parental wrath was apparently the cause of Miss Proffitt's suicide. It has been suggested that the girl might have intended to drink just enough of the poison to burn her mouth and frighten her mother, in the hope of escaping punishment, and that by mistake, she took a fatal poison. The real truth of the matter will be buried with the little victim.

It developed at the coroner's inquest that the ride taken Thursday night was the result of a postponed engagement, the young people having intended to make the trip to Portland one day last week. It was their desire, Miss Johnson said, to go to Portland to see a "good show."

Timmons, 22 years old, and Finucane, 19, hired the automobile Thursday night, and engaged E. G. Morris to drive for them. The boys took the machine to the home of Clara Johnson and Valerie Proffitt about 8 o'clock that night and then started for Portland. En route, they were delayed several hours through engine trouble, and it was about 3 o'clock when they finally arrived on the east side at Portland, had their machine towed to a garage for repairs, and went across the river on a street car.

After having a meal at a Washington street cafe, the members of the party went on a street car to the garage again and from there started for home. They reached Oregon City about 7 o'clock, had breakfast, and then the couples separated, Miss Proffitt accompanying Timmons and Miss Johnson going with Finucane.

Wanted to Go Home Alone.
At short distance from her home, Timmons said, Miss Proffitt asked him not to go any further, as her parents might not like it, so Timmons left her. The girl then went to the Everett & Hall store, bought a 10 cent bottle of carbolic acid, drank about half of it, when within 300 yards of her home, ran into the house and expired in her mother's arms.

Mrs. C. C. Hall, who sold Miss Proffitt the poison, said that the girl seemed in her usual spirits, stating that the baby at home had cut its hand badly.

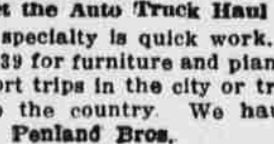
