ABANDON LIGHT AND POWER PLAN

Pendleton will not have a municipal power and light plant in the near future. All plans to acquire a power site on the Walla Walla river to be developed ultimately were abandoned last night when the council voted to return the option which it has held for the past half year.

The action last evening was taken because a caucus held a week ago revealed that the aldermanic proponents of a municipal light and power system were hopelessly in the minority, several of the councilmen who had originally been in favor of the idea having developed either opposition or an indifference. Chairman John Dyer of the special committee was the only one who held out strongly for further negotiations but when his associates refused to accept his suggestion that the owners of the power site be offered \$3000 instead of \$15,000 or that they be asked to turn it over gratis with the understanding that the city pay a reasonable price if the site were ever developed, he threw down his hands and last night made the motion himself to return the option.

80,000 DEER ROAM OREGON MOUNTAIN MEADOWS; 930 ELK

Labor Commissioner Hoff includes in his Biennial Report a Census of the Big Game of State by Counties.

Salem, Ore., Nov. 21.—There are 930 elk and 80,000 deer in the state of Oregon, according to figures compiled by Labor Commissioner O. P. Hoff for his biennial report.

It is estimated that Clatsop, Lincoln, Union and Curry counties each have 100 elk while Columbia has 80, Tillamook 75, Lane 70, Grant, Baker and Umatilla 50 each, Wallowa 45, Douglas 25, Linn, Yamhill, Clackamas and Wasco 15 each, Jackson and Washington 10 each, Harney 3 and Klamath 2.

Forest rangers and game wardens state the number of deer in the state at 80,000, scattered as follows: Curry 15,000, Douglas 10,000, Coos 9000, Jackson 7000, Lane 5000, Josephine 5000, Klamath 3500, Yamhill 2700, Union, 2600, Harney 2,000, Polk 2000, Crook 1500, Lake 1500, Grant 1500, Linn 1500, Benton

Injunction Is Made Permanent.

Judge Thomas Fitz Gerald, who is a referee in bankruptcy, has been notified that the U. S. federal court of Portland has made permanent the injunction restraining the sheriff from seizing the property belonging to the estate of the late L. T. Kidder of Athena. This ends a fight which has been continued through three courts. George B. Kidder, administrator, held a chattel mortgage against the property which Referee Fitz Gerald several months ago held to be void and fraudulent as to creditors. The matter was then taken up in the circuit court by a suit to foreclose the mortgage. The sheriff, acting under the instructions, attempted to seize the property but was prevented from so doing by a temporary injunction secured by B. E. Richards, trustee. It is this injunction which has been made permanent.
