## MOVING PICTURE GETS DROWNING

New York, Dec. 21.—An unidentified man unwittingly posed for a motion picture camera just off the Statue of Liberty by throwing himself from the upper deck of the Staten Island ferry boat Manhattan while the operator was taking pictures of the immigration service tug Emigrant.

To make the film all the more thrilling the man drowned while small boats from the Emigrant, the tug Mutual and from the Manhattan were racing to his rescue. The suicide took place a few moments after a ferry boat left her slip at St. George. By the most remarkable coincidence the motion picture man was sweeping that part of the harbor with his camera at the time.

The man was short, heavily built, smooth shaven, and walked with short, nervous steps. He had an overcoat and a sack coat beneath his arm. Calmly, and apparently oblivious of the fact that the machine was grinding on the bridge of the Emigrant not one hundred feet away, he mounted the rail and jumped.

The Mutual, which was towing the Danish steamer Duxna, lowered a lifeboat. The Manhattan's pilot, hearing the cry, "Man overboard!" reversed his engines and the Emigrant headed for the spot, with the motion picture man speeding his films.

When the rescuers arrived nothing but the two coats and a slouch hat were to be seen. The man failed to arise after sinking, following his plunge. In the smaller boat there was an empty spectacle case and 42 cents. There was nothing by which the owner could be identified.

## NEW WELL TURNS INTO WEE GEYSER

Natural Freak Is Interesting But Spouts Water Supply for Three Pines Men.

Grants Pass, Dec. 21.—Mysterious explosions coming from the depths of a dug well at the village of Three Pines, a few miles to the north of Grants Pass, having caused much speculation as to the cause of the phenomenon.

The well was dug last July by D. W. Davis is 41 1-2 feet in depth and six feet square. The excavation is through granite soil the entire depth, and the water vein was found in a narrow strata of clay that cut across the bottom of the well. When this vein was struck the water rose rapidly to a height of about six feet, where it has since remained.

Last Saturday night a series of explosions were heard within the well, and the water was churned into mud. One of these explosions was so severe that it jarred the earth and awakened the Davis family sleeping in the house 20 feet away.

Again Sunday night the phenomenon occurred at about the same hour, and at each explosion the water and gravel were hurled in a column nearly to the top of the well. Today Mr. Davis says the explosions are occurring at about 10 hour intervals, and that the water gets no chance to clear so as to be available for household use, for which purpose

the well was dug. He is installing a gasoline engine and pump and will attempt to pump all the water from the well to discover if possible what freak of nature it is that is spoiling the water for him.

There seems to be no more water in the well after one of its tantrums than there was before, and no one has a plausible explanation to offer for its behavior.

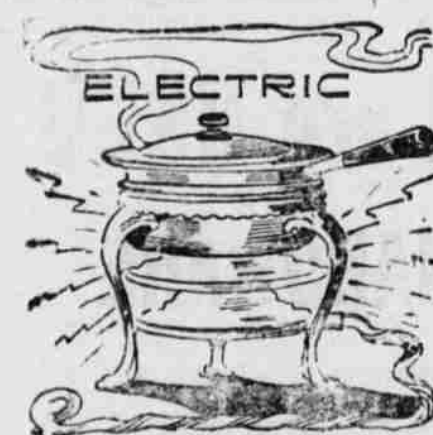

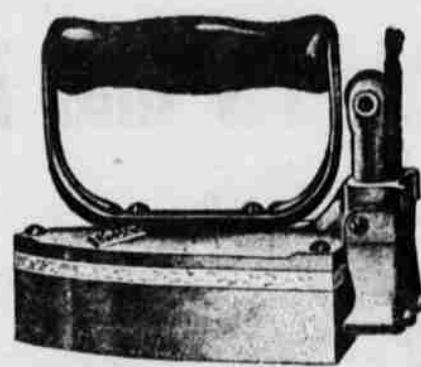
