

## USE COTTON SACKS

WASHINGTON-IDAHO FARMERS WILL BOYCOT THE BAG TRUST

Union Organization Takes Action—Will Secure Cotton Sacks From the South—10,000,000 Will be Purchased—to Investigate Market for Grain in the South.

Spokane, Wash., Dec. 21.—(Special)—After a year's debate involving a question of vital importance to wheat growers throughout the Spokane country, the Washington-Idaho State Farmers' union determined to use cotton sacks, boycotting what they declare is a "grain bag trust." The executive board, headed by President L. C. Crow of Pullman, Wash., took up the question of handling the grain in bulk or using cotton sacks and decided on the latter. Mr. Crow and P. W. Cox will visit the headquarters of the Farmers' Union in the south to secure sacks. In company with National President C. S. Barrett they will visit southern mills to purchase 10,000,000 cotton bags. While there they will investigate the possibility of opening up a market for Washington and Idaho grain in the south.

WILL EXTEND CAMPAIGN FOR LOWER FOOD PRICES

Philadelphia Housekeepers' League Having Crippled Egg Corner, Seeks New Victories.

Philadelphia.—Encouraged by the success attending their campaign to reduce the cost of living through the sale of "selected" storage eggs at a price from 6 to 20 cents a dozen cheaper than has heretofore prevailed, officers of the housekeepers' league announced their intention of broadening the scope of their activities.

Offers from farmers in Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland and Virginia to supply the league with other products at prices which would enable their distribution at a much less cost than now charged by the retailers have been received, according to Mrs. Daniel W. Simpkins, vice president of the organization.

Since the inauguration of the campaign for lower prices the league has disposed of 18,000 crates or 540,000 dozen eggs at 24 cents a dozen at six ty stations in different sections of the city.

EGGS BY PARCELS POST.

Government Successfully Sends Carton by Mail From Oklahoma City to Washington, 1,500 Miles.

Washington.—Demonstrating the possibilities of the parcel post, a carton of eggs, shipped by mail from Oklahoma City, a distance of 1,500 miles, was received unharmed by Postmaster General Hitchcock. Shipments of eggs by mail are prohibited until the parcel post becomes operative. The postal authorities were pleased with the successful experiment.

The eggs, wrapped in cotton and paper, and placed one in each of the divisions found in the ordinary egg carton, were merely marked "merchandise" and received the usual treatment accorded ordinary mail matter. Eggs, however, according to the rules promulgated for the conduct of the new service, must be marked "eggs."

Pennsylvania Food Bureau Determining Their Standard.

Philadelphia.—The Housekeepers' league, which began the sale of "selected" storage eggs at 24 cents a dozen a few days ago in order to break the high price of the product, reported that sales at all the egg stations continued brisk. The busiest station was the plaza at City Hall, where thousands of dozens were sold. It was learned that the state dairy and food bureau is closely watching the big sale. A special agent of the bureau has made numerous purchases of the 24-cent eggs, and they are being examined by a chemist to determine whether they are as good as represented.

BODY FAST IN CONCRETE DAM

Laborer Fell Into Frame While Keokuk Structure Was Being Built—Will Stay There.

Keokuk, Iowa.—A human hand protruding from tons of cement was found in one of the concrete pillars of the government dam across the Mississippi river. It explains the disappearance several weeks ago of a laborer.

The man's body is imbedded in solid concrete and is likely to stay there, as to blast it out would destroy not only the body but a great part of one of the largest blocks of cement composing the dam.

The disappearance of a laborer was noted several weeks ago, but it was not known he had fallen into the frame into which tons of cement were being dumped.

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LIFE SENTENCE FOR YOUTHFUL GUN TOTERS

Chicago.—The new law fixing the penalty for robbery with deadly weapons was invoked here when two young highwaymen were sentenced to life terms by Judge Burke in the criminal court. Joseph Williams and George Kehler, confessed bandits, are just 21 years old and Judge Burke commented on this in imposing sentence.

"It is a sad thing," he said, "but society must be protected. Here we have two able-bodied young men who have cast aside every prospect in life but justice can only say that the severity of the punishment is fitted to the crime."

PRESIDENT PARDONS CAPTAIN VAN SCHAAK

Washington, Dec. 21.—Captain William Van Schaack, master of the steamer General Slocum, which caught fire and sank in New York harbor, June 15, 1904, causing the death of 1000 persons, mostly women and children, and who was sentenced to the penitentiary, was pardoned by President Taft. Van Schaack's pardon goes into effect Christmas day.
