LOSES PIECE OF EAR IN A FIGHT

The four corners of the earth are represented in a case now in the hands of the district attorney, the result of a section crew altercation last night at Huron in which one of the combatants had a piece bitten out of one ear, his cheek and neck lacerated and several other parts of his anatomy chewed.
Representing the far north is Fred Johnson, an Alaskan Indian and the victim of the offending teeth. The far east has as its delegate Max, a Filipino, whose sharp molars inflicted the wounds on the Alaskan, John Arando, a native of Chill and James J. Tedolox, a Spaniard by blood and birth and the representatives of the far south and the far west and in the present case occupy the position of chief witnesses.
According to the story told by the latter two, the four men from the four corners of the earth have comprised the Huron section crew for a short time. Last night they say, Max and Johnson became involved in a dispute which was abruptly ended by the former dashing a cup of hot coffee in the face of the latter. As might be expected the Alaskan resented this treatment and a fight was the result. The Filipino's methods of warfare showed that he is not far removed from those ancestors who liked to diet on human flesh for he promptly seized one of the redskin's ears between his teeth and bit a some what ragged edged crescent in it. He then attacked his adversary's cheek and neck with his sharp incisors and finally, as a grand finale, bit through three thicknesses of cloth and sunk his teeth into the northerner's arm. The cannibalistic tactics of the south sea islander were too much for the Indian and he was glad to admit defeat.
When the battle was over, the gentleman from Chill mercifully located the piece of ear which had been bitten out and aided by needle, thread and court plaster, fixed it back in place. The Spaniard, Alaskan and Chilean then came to the city and swore out a warrant for the arrest of their carnivorous fellow section hand.
