HERRING CROP BIGGEST IN YARMOUTH'S HISTORY

Year's Harvest 700,000,000 Fish, Valued at \$20 a "Cran"—About 1000.

Great Yarmouth.—As if to compensate for the ruin on the land, the waters off the east coast of England have yielded such a golden harvest as no one deemed possible. From September until today, when the harvest is at its end, herring have come in draughts that may be called quite miraculous.

Fishermen were bringing fair quantities of herring into Yarmouth in 1912 and probably much earlier. But in the thousand years of the industry never such a yield and seldom such a price has been recorded.

One day a single "drifter," as the herring boat is most properly named, came into Lowestoft with a load of 150,000 fish. Of this lot those which were sold fresh brought the unparalleled price of \$20 a "cran" (roughly a thousand fish). The harvest of this year is interesting socially, industrially and from the point of view of natural history.

Roughly stated, this year's harvest has yielded at least 700,000,000 fish.

WALK TRESTLE; TWO DEAD.

Railroad Man Takes Family on New Year's Outing With Fatal Results.

Cincinnati.—Eugene W. Dahl, traveling freight agent of the Grand Trunk Railroad, and his young son were instantly killed when they were hit by a train on the Cincinnati, Lebanon and Northern Railroad tracks at Pleasant Ridge, a suburb.

Dahl, his son, Mrs. Dahl and her father were crossing a trestle when the train bore down on them.

Mrs. Dahl and her father barely managed to get off the trestle in time.

Los Angeles, Jan. 13.—The trial of Anton Johansson, a San Francisco labor leader, charged in federal indictment with conspiring to transport dynamite illegally, was put over today until the April term of the district court.

PARISH AID TO Use Pastime Theater for a Benefit Performance.

The ladies of the Parish Aid of the Episcopal church will appear in the role of theatrical managers on next Thursday, on which date the Pastime theater will be turned over to them for absolute charge afternoon and evening. The performance will be in the nature of a benefit for the church, to help pay paying expenses. Aside from the excellent program arranged by Manager Matlock, the ladies themselves have arranged for the presentation of several numbers to be taken part in by local talent, and the press agent is responsible for the statement that the most surprising acts ever presented in this city will be put on. There will be no change in the price of admission.

PRINCETON BUILDING BURNED.

First Presbyterian School for Training Ministers Suffers \$15,000 Damage.

Princeton, N. J.—Alexander hall, the main building of the Princeton Theological seminary, and the first structure to be erected in the United States by the Presbyterian church for the education of students intended for the ministry, was visited by fire. The entire fourth floor was destroyed and the rest of the building was damaged by water. The loss, estimated at \$15,000, is covered by insurance.

MYSTERY IN WOMAN'S MURDER.

Body Richly Garbed and Wearing Jewels Is Found in Malden, Mass.

Boston, Mass.—With every circumstance pointing to murder, the body of a richly dressed, middle aged woman was found near Holy Cross cemetery in Malden.

There were indications of a struggle. Here and there were strands of hair, torn out by the roots. Pieces of the woman's coat and other outer garments were strewn about.

That robbery was not the motive for the crime was shown by the fact that the woman's jewels had not been removed.

HOW THEY COURT IN WALES.

Young Men and Girls, Barefoot, Stay in Kitchen Till Early Morning.

London.—Courtship in rural parts in Wales was described in the following terms by the Rev. Gwilym Davies of Carmarthen, at the West Wales Free Church Council's Federation of Llanelly:

"Next Saturday night hundreds of young farm hands would set out for the social event of the week, a courtship expedition. By 10 or 11 o'clock the young man would be throwing dust at the girl's bedroom window as a signal that he had arrived. The girl would creep downstairs without boots to open the kitchen door. The youthful lover would also very likely take off his boots and the pair would remain together in the kitchen till 3 or 4 o'clock next morning."

"It should be said in their defense that they had no other opportunity, and besides, if a young man and a young woman were seen walking together in the daylight to or from chapel, it would be a subject for ridicule and scandal."

LADIES MANAGE THEATER.

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SLAKE-LIKE CREATURE FRIGHTENS BEHOLDERS

Findlay, Ohio, Jan. 13.—The appearance above this city of what appeared to be a huge snake-like creature with great wings that carried it along at a fearful velocity, has thrown the neighborhood into consternation.

An hourly as it could be described by Mrs. D. Pickla, 1913 Foraker avenue, West Park, who had the first and most distinct view of the monster. It resembled nothing so much as a pterodactyl, a supposedly extinct species of flying lizard, remains of which have been found in geological deposits of the Lower Jurassic or Mesozoic age.

Several times it has been seen hovering above West Park, but the other day it swooped down within not more than 50 feet of where Mrs. Pickla was standing in her yard, then with a whirling of wings, louder than the clatter of an aeroplane, it rose to a considerable height and made for a wood several miles distant.

The bird has a long neck, an enlarged snakelike body and, as nearly as she could make out, four feet. What seemed to be brilliantly colored feathers grew from a long, thick tail which the creature used as a rudder to guide its flight.

The body and half neck were covered with what appeared small, gray feathers, while the rest of the neck was covered with scales like those of a fish. The head is small and the beak a long affair, slightly hooked at the end.

The wings spread about six feet from tip to tip and according to Mrs. Pickla's description are attached to the body of the ornithosaur in three or four places. Naturalists have been unable to state authoritatively that the rhamphorhynchus, of which order the air-going reptiles the pterodactyl belongs, earth where they swarmed eons ago.

Search will be made of the woods where it is thought to have a resting place. There are many marshes in the vicinity where such a creature might hide.

RAGGERS ARE DIPPY

OVER CORKSCREW DIP

Bill Lange Introduces Graceful Dance at St. Francis Ball on New Year's Eve.

San Francisco.—Can you do the corkscrew dip?

If not, you must learn at once, for it is judged to be the prettiest and most graceful of all the evolutions of the rag dance.

It is the optheosis of the rag. It was discovered, invented and patented by no less an expert on Terpsichorean tricks than the great "Bill" Lange himself.

Something new is born every New Year's eve in San Francisco. Tuesday 1913 was born at midnight, and contemporaneous with the birth of a new year was the birth of the corkscrew dip.

Rags were getting to be monotonous. The dancers at the St. Francis ball were calling for something new that wouldn't altogether do away with the rag itself. And big "Bill" Lange came to the rescue.

Look Ten Minutes' Thought.

After ten minutes' cogitation in an alcove Lange and his wife emerged upon the floor of the St. Francis ballroom with this new variation of the rag.

All the floor was cleared for the demonstration. It needed but a few bars of rag music to convince the dancers that "Bill" Lange had maintained his reputation as a maker of jollity. The corkscrew dip was a success. It was more than a success. It has become a vogue.

The dance proceeds just like the ordinary rag until the dip comes. And with the dip comes the corkscrew.

This is how it was done: The lady and gentleman dip together. They are on the knee, the lady on her right knee, the gentleman on his left. Without changing the position of the toes the knees are raised and "dipped" three times in succession. Then, still resting on the toes, the lady changes her position to the left knee and the gentleman to his right. The "dip" in this reverse position is repeated three times to the swing of the music and the dance proceeds as before.

Proclaimed Best of All.

The St. Francis dancers caught the idea and went to it with a will. In a few minutes everybody was doing it, making a new and pretty picture that was acclaimed to be the best of all variations yet discovered.

Now everybody's doing it before dinner, during dinner and after dinner.

Once you start it you can't stop. It's as infectious as the rag, only more so.

Lange, who is a member of the Olympic and Family clubs, and as well known and popular as any clubman in town, when asked about the new dance, said:

"Oh, there's nothing particular to it. It's just a pretty dance, that's all, and everybody likes it. The dance is certainly graceful and effective."

GARRETT COMMENTS ON BOISE JUSTICE

So spoke Jess Garrett, former Portland hurler, who has just been given his release by Pendleton as he gazed at a newspaper account of the falling of two Boise newspapermen by the Idaho supreme court, according to an exchange.

"I had a touch of Boise justice last fall," added Garrett, who makes his home in Portland and who, incidentally desires to do a comeback stunt in 1913.

"My experience is particularly vivid. When I produced sworn affidavits from three players and two outsiders that Empire Golden had offered to let Boise beat my Pendleton team out of second place in the Western Tri-state league, they arrested me, made me fork up \$1500 in bail to keep out of prison, and then advised me to shut up and the case would be dropped. Of course, I shut up."

Further, Golden was given a two days' vacation by President Sweet of the league, who resides in Boise, so as to line things up with the authorities. He umpired the last four or five games and we won one game in that series. I pitched the first game after he reassumed his umpiring job and everything I pitched went for balls. Oh! that was a fine mess of justice."

Garrett managed the Pendleton team but will not be there this season. Jack Barry and others who battled against him said Jess' arm was as good as ever and the Texan hopes to land some class B club this year.
