WOULD STOP ALIENS CARRYING FIREARMS

Greek and Italian railroad laborers and aliens of all kinds will be prohibited from owning or having in possession, firearms of all kinds, if a bill to be presented to the legislature this week becomes a law. The bill is one of many being offered by the state board of fish and game commissioners.

Among other radical changes suggested is one prohibiting the use of firearms by boys under 14 years of age.

The board would also have a law passed licensing trappers and guides for hunting parties. The latter bill provides that the guide shall be held responsible for violations of the game laws by any member of the party by which he is employed.

A reciprocal game license regulation with the states of Washington, Idaho, California and Nevada, is suggested. This provides that in case these border states pass similar laws, a resident of any one of these states, holding a license in his own state shall be permitted to purchase an Oregon license at resident rates, instead of non-resident rates as at present.

WIVES OF WOMAN ASSIST IN ESCAPE

Toronto Jimmy's Wife Lures Loe Jailer Away from Jail at Rochester, Minn.

Chicago.—According to Lieutenant Larkin of the detective bureau, the Mrs. James Johnson, or Mrs. Margaret Johnson, they have under arrest, was living with Johnson in November, 1903, when he was arrested in connection with a safe blowing. They were not married at that time. Four men were arrested in connection with the 'job' which was committed in Dover, Minn. Johnson and the other men, Bud Flynn, Lefty Fitzgerald and Omaha Tommy, who were arrested in connection with the blowing of the safe, were locked up for

a time at the jail at Rochester, the county seat.

Lured Away the Jailer. Mrs. Johnson was then known as Margaret Brittenstein. According to Lieutenant Larkin the Brittenstein woman gained admittance to the jail when it was left in charge of one keeper. She made love to the lone jailer and lured him away from the jail, the police officials said.

While the woman had the jailer away a man known to the police as Automobile Jim broke into the inclosure and saved the bars to Toronto Jimmy Johnson's cell. The jailer came back before he had time to open the cells of the other prisoners and only Johnson escaped," said Lieutenant Larkin. "Automobile Jim" was later killed in Memphis, Tenn., when he was shot while trying to "pull off a job. Some time later Johnson was arrested for a burglary in Columbus, Ohio, and served a year in the Ohio state penitentiary. Recently Toronto Jimmy Johnson was arrested for robbery in Milwaukee, and he is now serving a sentence in Waupun.

NEW JAPANESE PREMIER TO CUT DOWN EXPENSES

Tokio.—Prince Taro Katsura, the new Japanese premier, in the course of an interview said:

"I am not yet in a position fully to outline the policy to be pursued by the new cabinet. I hope, however, its policy will follow the principle guiding my government, which is already familiar to the foreign public.

"My efforts so far have been directed to cultivating amicable relations between Japan and the treaty powers. There shall be no change in this respect.

"As for home politics, my financial policy will be more direct and more comprehensive than it was during my last tenure of office. Owing to the lack of time in which to compile a new budget, that of the current year will be presented to the diet with an assurance that \$25,000,000 will be saved by the end of the next fiscal year. Economies in finance will receive my utmost consideration."

The captain was formerly stationed at Fort Benjamin Harrison at Indianapolis and during the terrible floods on the Mississippi was detailed in the work of aiding and protecting the sufferers.

Being Tried for Third Time.

For the third time within a few months, an effort is being made to prove that Lynn Hill, indicted jointly with Charles Modrell for the larceny of horses, is guilty as charged. At the two previous trials, the jury disagreed, the majority in the first one standing for acquittal and in the second for conviction. A peculiar feature of the case is that a different prosecutor has had charge of the case at each trial. Deputy District Attorney S. A. Newberry represented the state in the first trial, District Attorney Van Vactor in the second and Frederick Steiwer, the new district attorney, is in charge of the present one. The jury was selected this morning and the taking of evidence commenced at the afternoon session. Hill claims that he did not assist in stealing the horses, but was hired by Modrell to drive them to La Grande. Modrell, who pleaded guilty, is the principal witness of the state against Hill.

DINING ROOM FOR DOGS.

For 6 Cents Animal May Eat Fill of Mutton Bones or Beef.

London.—The proprietress of a Chelsea restaurant has established a dining room for dogs. While their mistresses are having luncheon or dinner the dogs are placed in another room in charge of a maid, who feeds them with mutton bones and cooked beef. A dog's dinner costs 6 cents, and he is allowed to eat his fill of the food which suits him best.

"I found," said the proprietress, "that many of my customers had their dogs at the same table, and in some cases allowed them to eat from their plates on the floor. I am a dog lover myself, but I draw the line at eating from plates used by dogs.

"I therefore started a separate dining room for dogs, and both the dogs and their mistresses are delighted."

WOMAN KILLS HUSBAND AS HE EATS SUPPER

Waupaca, Wis., Jan. 13.—Unrepentant and refusing to retain counsel, Mrs. Albert Palzer, who killed her husband with a bludgeon Tuesday is held in jail here. Mrs. Palzer was arrested following the funeral and confessed to the killing which was witnessed by Mrs. Palzer's thirteen children. The woman said she crept up behind her husband as he ate his supper and smashed his head with one blow. She burned the weapon and washed the blood from the floor. Her husband's cruelty, she declared, was the motive.

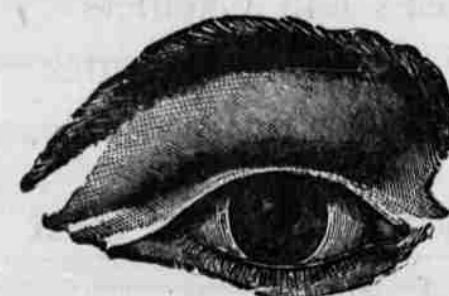
