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DR. HARRY LANE ELECTED TO U. S. SENATE BY LEGISLATURE

Procedure is Lacking in Spectacular Effect in Either Branch of Law Making Bodies.

THREE FAIL TO VOTE

Two Houses Will Meet Tomorrow to Canvass Vote and Finally Declare Election—Receives 28 Votes in Senate and 59 Votes in House of Representatives.

State Capitol, Salem, Ore., Jan. 21.—Dr. Harry Lane, democrat, was elected senator to succeed Jonathan Bourne, Jr., at noon today in a separate session of the legislature, receiving 28 votes from the senate and 59 votes from the house.

The election was lacking in spectacular effect in either house. In the senate Lane was nominated by Miller and seconded by McCulloch. In the house Reames nominated Lane and Hagood seconded.

Tomorrow the two houses will meet in joint session to canvass the vote and at that time the election of Lane will be finally declared.

REBELS LOOT RANCH AND ABDUCT WOMEN

Mexico City, Jan. 21.—Killing four employees and abducting several women, rebels raided the ranch of J. M. Glendon, an American, near Chihuahua, today. The ranch building was looted and burned. Glendon's son with his wife and child, made their escape with difficulty.

WICKERSHAM DROPS PHONE INVESTIGATION

Washington, Jan. 21.—Attorney General Wickersham has abandoned the proposal to attack the American Telephone & Telegraph Company or the Bell system under the Sherman anti-trust law, and has referred the whole telephone and telegraph subject to the Interstate Commerce Commission for investigation and regulation.

EXPLAINS HIS ORDER CANCELLING LEASES

Washington, Jan. 21.—In defense of his order cancelling proposed leases of eight hundred thousand acres of all lands in the Osage Indian reservation in Oklahoma, Secretary Fisher appeared before the house committee on Indian affairs. Fisher and Assistant Secretary Adams were questioned at length by C. J. Leahy, attorney for the ousted Osage Indian chiefs.

COURT REFUSES TO TAKE CLANCY'S BOND

Chicago, Jan. 21.—Bonds for the release of E. A. Clancy of San Francisco from Fort Leavenworth prison were rejected by Judge Baker of the federal circuit court of appeals. This means his release will be delayed two weeks.

WILSON SAYS THERE'S TO BE NO FUSS OVER HIS WASHINGTON TRIP

Trenton, N. J., Jan. 21.—New Jersey affairs will occupy Governor Wilson's attention up to the time of his inauguration. The governor discussed the plans today and wanted it understood no fuss will be made over his trip to Washington.

PLOTTERS AGAINST MADERO ARRESTED

Washington, Jan. 21.—Charged with plotting against the life of Madero, two supposed anarchists, whose names are withheld, were arrested at Tampa, Florida, according to the state department. More arrests are expected.
