HAS POWER SITE

NEW CONCERN TAKES CONTROL OF OXBOW ON SNAKE RIVER

Idaho-Oregon Company is Ousted—Failed to Heed the Law—Idaho Consolidated Power and Utilities Company Now Has Control of Water—Backed by Rockefeller.

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 21.—The Idaho Consolidated Power & Utilities company, a Delaware corporation, backed by John D. Rockefeller and the Harriman estate, has wrested control of the Oxbow from the Idaho-Oregon Light & Power company in which promises to be one of the greatest power works ever started in the western country. The legal coup is securing control of the Oxbow upon which the Idaho-Oregon Light & Power company is estimated to have spent at least \$750,000 in preliminary development was engineered by the law firm of which Samuel Untermyer, the noted New York attorney, is connected. The whole matter was arranged under the laws of Oregon, which have recently been changed to conform to the Idaho statutes upon water and power rights, and the rumor is that the Idaho-Oregon concern failed to comply with the new law and thereby lost the Oxbow, which is said to be one of the greatest power sites on the Snake river.

Work on the Oxbow.

About six years ago the Idaho-Oregon Light & Power company started to develop the Oxbow in conjunction with its other properties. When the recent large bond issue was sold in New York the Idaho-Oregon had it provided as one of the conditions of the trust deed which secured the bonds that \$2,000,000 would be expended in developing the power site. Work has been done by the local power company but it has been intermittent and for some time nothing has been done toward developing the power site, according to the contentions set up by those who say that the Idaho-Oregon has lost it to the new concern. Under the Oregon laws it is said there was a provision that work in developing power sites must be continuous and the representatives of the Idaho Consolidated Power & Utilities company claim that the local concern has forfeited its rights to the Oxbow because work was stopped.

HE WAS FIRST TO FIND OREGON GOLD

Baker, Or., Jan. 21.—David S. Littlefield, 81 years old, the last surviving member of the party that discovered gold in eastern Oregon in 1861, died here after a short illness.

He was a pioneer of this section of the country. Born in Maine he lived here upward of 60 years, moving to Baker from Auburn, Wash.

While being a member of the historic party, Littlefield went into placer mining, a few years with varying success, then followed ranching. He retired a few years ago well to do.

Littlefield came to eastern Oregon from California, making the trip around Cape Horn in the gold rush days. With Henry Griffin and others in 1861 he was engaged in a search for the famous Blue Bucket diggings, told of by followers of the old French trail.

The reputed rich ground was never found, but Littlefield, while prospecting opened up a very rich placer ground in a ravine afterward named Griffin's gulch, in honor of the leader of the party.

He was one of the best known characters in eastern Oregon. He was always traveling about when his health permitted and was everybody's friend. He was twice married, being survived by the second wife and five children.

HOLDS DYNAMITE TO STOMACH; SETS IT OFF

Centralia, Wash.—B. O. Croop, prominent rancher living a half mile out of Toledo, committed suicide by holding a stick of dynamite next to his stomach and touching off the explosive. The man was literally blown to pieces. Croop sustained a bad fall from a tree several years ago and it is believed that his act was due to an attack of temporary insanity caused by the effects.

In models his flying boat is similar to the Curtis tydro-aeroplane, but many innovations which tend to the comfort and safety of those on board have been added.

Craft Luxuriously Furnished. It is designed to carry two passengers besides the pilot and will be luxuriously finished in mahogany, with deep upholstered seats not unlike those of an automobile.

Instead of the usual pontoons, a boat has been provided, which can be instantly detached from the flying apparatus, so that in case of accident the boat can be driven through the water under its own power.

The hull is 24 feet long and three feet wide, with a floating capacity of 4000 pounds, divided into six airtight

NEW WARM CURRENT FOUND IN THE PACIFIC

Head of Australian Fisheries Discovers Gulf Stream 100 Miles Wide.

Sydney, N. S. W., Jan. 21. Discovery of a new "gulf stream" is reported by Commissioner Dannevig, of the Australian Fisheries department.

He has found a warm current which originates in the equatorial Pacific and flows toward Eastern Australia and Tasmania at the rate of seven miles an hour. The current is about 100 miles wide.

compartments. The engine, which is set in the boat, is a Curtis 80-horse power model, and the power will be

transmitted to the propeller by chain.

The boat is entirely covered over, except the cockpit, which is provided by a rising hood, affording protection from spray. The engine is equipped with a self-starter and the plans is provided with an electric lighting system. The exhaust from the motor is so arranged as to heat the seating space in case of cold weather.

The directors of the company, which is capitalized at \$200,000, are Silas Christofferson, Ernest Hamner and H. P. Christofferson.
