SUB-CENTRAL AGENCY OF FRUIT DISTRIBUTORS IS INCORPORATED

Walla Walla, Wash., April 22.—Articles of incorporation for the Walla Walla District Fruit Distributors of Spokane, to have headquarters in Walla Walla, were signed by J. D. Taggard of Watsburg, and Dr. C. F. Schlitz of Dayton, representatives of the Touchet Valley Growers' Union; Harry Huber and J. H. Chapman, representatives of the Milton Fruit-growers' union, and H. G. Barnes and E. P. Jensen of the Walla Walla Valley Fruitgrowers' association of Milton.

The six incorporators are to manage the affairs of the corporation for the first six months as trustees.

After the articles have been filed with the secretary of state and a certificate is received, the trustees will meet, elect officers and start operations.

The local union has been represented at none of the meetings since the first general meeting of growers at which the plan of the North Pacific Distributors was explained. It is probable that the local union and others of the Walla Walla district will affiliate with the sub-central selling agency at a later date. Such affiliation is provided for in the by-laws.

James M. Kyle, mayor of Stanfield, and Harry M. Sommerer of Hermiston were present at the meeting and say the growers in their respective territories are in favor of affiliation with the Walla Walla sub-central.

I. W. W.'S RELEASED ON PROMISE TO LEAVE CITY

Denver, April 22.—The Industrial Workers of the World, numbering 100, who were jailed as vagrants here last week, were released by the city

authorities. The prisoners agreed to leave the city at once and the local branch of the organization promised to head off the members who were reported marching on Denver from the west. The compromise followed a meeting of the Industrial Workers in the jail, at which they sent for Chief of Police O'Neill and told him that they would leave Denver if they were given their freedom.

MUST PAY 2 PER CENT INTEREST TO COUNTY

Salem, Ore., April 22.—According to an opinion rendered by Assistant Attorney-General Van Winkle, banks

under the county deposit act passed by the legislature must pay 2 per cent interest for county money. The committee to which the bill was referred intended to make the rate 1 per cent and so provided in the form of the bond to be given, but the other provisions provided 2 per cent, and the Assistant Attorney-General holds these provisions control the rate.
